Neponset River proposed for Superfund EPA would oversee contamination cleanup

On Tuesday Oct. 5, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) held a virtual meeting to update the public on its proposal to add a 3.7-mile section of the Lower Neponset River to the Superfund National Priorities List (NPL).

It was the first EPA hosted public meeting regarding the site since February, 2020. Its highlight was Meghan Cassidy, deputy director of its New England Superfund and Emergency Management Division, announcing its official proposal for NPL inclusion, filed on Sept. 9, and a 60-day public comment period that will be open through Nov. 8.

The nearly hour-and-a-half Zoom meeting drew more than 160 attendees, including a number of elected officials and rep-

resentatives of several community groups, including the Neponset River Watershed Association (NepRWA). In addition to the two announcements, the session featured a brief slide show reviewing what had originally been presented at the 2020 meeting, followed by a lengthy Q&A session.

The NPL is comprised of nationwide sites that the EPA has determined pose long-term threats to human health and the environment. NPL sites are eligible for EPA investigation and cleanup in accordance with the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA), better known as the Superfund program.

The stretch of the Neponset River proposed for the NPL runs from its confluence with Mother Brook – at Hyde Park’s Grimké Sisters Bridge – down-

stream to the Walter Baker Dam at Eliot and Adams streets in Lower Mills. This channelized portion of the river – industrialized for most of the city’s history – is heavily polluted with highly-toxic PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls): temperature- and pressure-resistant chemical compounds widely used in commercial and manufacturing applications. Though banned in the United States since 1979, their slow breakdown rate and their contamination of river sediment continue to make them an ongoing health and environmental danger. In the case of the lower Neponset site, dams further exacerbate this problem.

In 2016, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) – after having previously overseen a

Mulvey Jacobson Square dedication this weekend

Boston will be dedicating the corner of Park Street and Centre Street on Oct. 16 at 11 a.m. to the late Mary Mulvey Jacobson.

Jacobson was a force in West Roxbury, known among other things for bringing back the Irish Social Club from the brink of collapse and for her Families in Need program, which delivers full turkey dinners to families all over the Parkway in November and December.

She also headed the West Roxbury Business and Professional Association, the reins of which have been picked up by Jim Hennigan, of Hennigan Insurance. He said Mary’s

brother Tom Mulvey was instrumental in bringing about this dedication for his sister.

“I give all the credit to Tom for being persistent,” he said. “He’s been talking with the City for the past year and the Boston Transportation Department just finally went, ‘Sure.’”

Hennigan said it will be a good time to remember Jacobson and tell stories.

Mulvey said he knows there will be a big response from the community because she spent her life helping people.

“She warrants this,” he said. “She was a good deed doer. She was a great person and a good sister. She just had it all.”

All-electric bus facility planned for Arborway

Scott Hamwey, Director of Bus Modernization for the MBTA, announced at the virtual Sept. 28 Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council (JPNC) meeting that a new bus garage was being planned for a large part of the Arborway Yard.

The MBTA first announced the idea 23 years ago, in June 1998.

That 1998 communiqué activated over twenty years of community-based meetings,

negotiations, and memorandums of understanding (MOUs) that were set in motion by the late Senator Brian Joyce and the late Rep. Kevin Fitzgerald and soon joined by the late mayor Tom Menino; only Rep Liz Malia remains with any legislative memory of that long process.

That process culminated in 2000 with 41 recommendations advanced by the Arborway Committee, chaired by Henry Allen, who has since retired. Those commitments included a bus facility of no more than 104 buses and a set-

aside of eight acres for housing/commercial development. The bus facility that was estimated to cost \$139 million in 2000 morphed into \$200 million in 2014.

Alexandra Markiewicz, project manager for bus modernization, joined Hamwey.

He said that the Arborway bus yard (in operation since

1895 and enlarged in 1925) has a capacity of 118 buses, but the need today is for 200 all electrified buses including articulated 60-foot buses such as the number 39 to Copley Square.

More than that has changed in 23 years; there are today 600 units of housing and an at-grade parkway replacing the aged overpass that loomed

over the bus yard in 1998.

In 2001, to the surprise of many in the Arborway community, the MBTA razed the enormous brick streetcar and bus garages built in 1925 and 1928.

It ripped up and paved over the trolley tracks and built pre-fabricated fueling and mainte-

CRNG reviews plans for Sprague Pond, Basketball and Urban Wilds

The Hyde Park Central River Neighborhood Group (CRNG) met on Oct. 5 and discussed a wide range of topics.

Emily Carrara, aide to State Rep. Rob Consalvo, said the City of Boston recently received a grant from the State Office of Energy and Environment to help purchase land near the Dedham line. The land consists of the Sprague Pond Lakeside Park off of Lakeside Avenue and the pond.

“That whole area is of criti-

cal environmental concern,” she said. “And so the city is looking to purchase that area and do some archaeological investigation. We also want to preserve the natural elements at the site and make it a place that the community can enjoy.”

Neponset River Watershed Association (NepRWA) Greenways Coordinator Andres Ripley discussed the Boston Urban Wilds Park at the intersection of West and Austin streets. Ripley said they will be hosting a walk-through of the site on Oct. 17 at 4:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. He said they will be gath-

ering at the intersection of West Street and Pierce Street. He said the walk will include a discussion of what improvements to the area may look like.

“Pat Alvaraz from the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation, along with some folks from the Solomon Foundation will be leading that and I think (CRNG President) Melanie Daye will be there as well,” he said. “People can come and hear what some folks have in mind about what this project could look like, ask questions about the scope of the project, say if

they want something specific to be taken into consideration, all those comments and considerations are welcome. The more people we have from the community the better, because this is in your neighborhood and we want you to enjoy the space and make it your own.”

Ripley said the last CRNG meeting discussed a lot of improvements for the park, which he said residents were very enthusiastic about and that NepRWA is happy to push along.

“It seemed like a lot of people were on board for improving the park, which is nice,” he said.

Also during the meeting, member James Michel said the Hyde Park Youth Basketball Association is looking to make a triumphant return this winter.

“The core group is working on it,” he said. “For those who don’t know, this is a marvelous community program that has been running since the 1980s.

It serves both boys and girls between the ages of 6 and 14. We lost last year due to COVID, but cross your fingers that there will be a program and that there will be children running around learning about the game of basketball and learning about teamwork and sportsmanship this winter.”

Registration is now open and residents can go to www.hydeparkyba.com or send an email over to hpybasketball@gmail.com to sign up.

Also during the meeting, Paul Broderick, District E-18 of the Boston Police Department (BPD) Community Resource gave an update on criminal activities in the neighborhood dating back to Aug. 3.

Broderick said for the whole of District E-18 from January until Oct. 5 compared to last year, crime is down 20 percent.

He said on Aug. 7, there was

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Scavenger Hunt this Saturday

The West Roxbury-based charity Anna's Pals will be trying something wholly different this year with its Amazing Race scavenger hunt starting at St. Theresa's Donahue Hall.

The Amazing Race is this Saturday, Oct. 16 at 7 p.m. and will feature the hunt throughout the West Roxbury neighborhood. Anna's Pals President Kristen Jerome said she wanted to try something different to help raise funds for their charitable work.

"We just wanted to do something different," she said. "I felt like with the pandemic, people have been trapped inside and are now starting to come out a bit more. We also have a couple of local businesses where we hope participants will end up. It's good to introduce people to these businesses to bring the community together a little bit."

She said the mechanics of the race will work pretty much like any other scavenger hunt, with a few caveats.

"People will get a sheet with riddles on it and they'll have to solve the riddles and complete the tasks assigned with that riddle," she said. "Then, they'll have to come back to St. Theresa's, solve one more puzzle there and, whoever does all those things and has them all correct, will be the winner. It's a winner-take-all event and there's a cash prize."

Jerome said she wants the event to start early.

"My goal is to have everybody out into the community by 7:15 p.m.," she said. "At the end, we'll come back and we'll have a DJ and a cash bar. It'll just be a chance to socialize and meet other residents."

Jerome said they wanted to do a scavenger hunt because it gives people the chance to participate without having to be inside with a boatload of

other people.

"If someone doesn't want to come back and participate socially at the end of the hunt, they don't have to," she said. "They are not forced into a crowded room."

Jerome said they will be taking precautions inside the St. Theresa's Gym.

"It's a big room; we'll have the doors open and we'll have ventilation so people should feel safe," she said.

Each team will be limited to four persons so that participants only have to use one vehicle.

Jerome hopes the community will feel safe enough to come out and support the charity her daughter's friends helped create.

a domestic assault on Reddy Avenue where the boyfriend was arrested and one on Pierce Street on Aug. 27 where the girlfriend was arrested. On Sept. 24, a student at Roxbury Prep alleged that a school staff member slapped their head. The teacher said they were trying to remove ear buds from the student who refused to take them out.

Broderick said there were no robberies, drug arrests or vehicle thefts during this time period. For breaking and entering crimes, he said there was one on River Street at the YMCA on Aug. 27. A male and female entered the Y between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m. and stole computer equipment. He said they have been identified and are currently being sought by the BPD.

On Sept. 6 on Pierce Street, Broderick said a 911 observed a male remove a basement window to gain access. Officers on the scene reported finding the suspect on the scene and arrested him.

For larcenies, Broderick said that on Aug. 7 at the Price Rite on River Street four youths came in and stole \$16 worth of ice cream. On Aug. 30 and 31, a package was reported stolen on River Street and on Nott Street respectively.


"I personally felt bad asking businesses who themselves are struggling to donate to us, so we pretty much laid low the last couple of months," she said. "We were able to have our golf tournament this year, which was great because we weren't able to have it last year, but fundraising has been on the lighter side for obvious reasons."

Jerome's daughter Anna was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia at the age of 14. Her specific diagnoses left her homebound for

most of her illness. Her family and friends rallied for her. She declined a gift from the Make-A-Wish Foundation because she believed there were more deserving kids out there. Her friends visited when they could, and they became the original Anna's Pals. Now, the charity works to help immune-compromised patients experience all they can from life during their treatment.

Mulvey said he had been thinking of doing this for a couple of years and he was finally able to push it through.

"I'm pretty friendly with (District 6 City Councilor) Matt O'Malley and, as far as anybody from the city goes, he was all really up for this," he said. "He muddled through the mess of bureaucracy and made it happen for us. I'm really happy for Matt. He's been a longtime friend of Mary and me; he's another good deed doer."

Mulvey said Jacobson was president of the Irish Social

Club and he admired how she was able to take control of the club and made sure it stayed open.

"That was a big part of our parents' life at the time, not in that particular spot, but when the Social Club was a budding organization. My parents were deeply involved with the club, including the dancing, so it was important for my family and Mary to keep it alive. She kept it open for everyone. I mean if you ever wanted to find Mary and couldn't get her on the phone, you just had to go there. She was always trying to make updates to the building or getting the membership up; she was just a great person."

Mulvey said the dedication will be a testament to her kindness.

"She always thought of other people," she said. "The way she was with other people was just the way she was with her siblings and friends. We learned from our mother and father to be kind and were blessed growing up. Now

there's just so many people she affected in a positive way."

Mulvey said his sister had connections all across the country. He related a story when the YMCA was dedicating a room to her while she was still alive, and Congressman Stephen Lynch spoke about her dedication to the local community and anyone in need.

"He got up, Mary was in hospice at the time, so we were doing it by laptop so she could be a part of it, and Steve said 'The one thing I'd like to do is to have Mary's cell phone, because if I needed something done in Sacramento California, and I couldn't get it done, I'd call Mary,'" he said. "She knew people all over the place, from Chicago, North and South Carolina to California, people were willing to help her because they knew it wasn't about her. It was about something she was trying to do for somebody else. This is a big deal for my family."

\$14-million polluter financed cleanup of Mother Brook – asked the EPA to consider proposing the Lower Neponset for NPL inclusion because of the site’s size and complexity, and the federal agency’s greater finances and resources.

Since then, the EPA has reviewed prior site samplings taken by both MassDEP and the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) and conducted its own preliminary site evaluation. This led to a letter of concurrence from Gov. Charlie Baker in June, the EPA’s completion of its Hazard Ranking System (HRS) package in July, and its NPL proposal in September.

“Depending on the nature and number of comments, we are hopeful that we can finalize

the site on the NPL in 2022,” Cassidy said of the proposal as it stands now. “But, again, a schedule for that can’t really be determined until the end of the public comment period.”

If the Lower Neponset is added to the National Priorities List, the EPA will then try to identify parties that may have contributed to its contamination as it finalizes its site plan, organizes its internal team, and determines its strategy moving forward.

“The Superfund program is premised on the theory that polluters pay,” Cassidy explained, adding that if those responsible are found, they will be given the opportunity to perform site work, or the EPA may perform the work and seek to recover

costs from the parties in question. If no such parties are found, federal funding would then be used for the project.

The Q&A portion of the meeting ran approximately 45 minutes, with questions posted in the Zoom chatroom and then presented to Cassidy for her response. Most concerned the possibility of expanding the site’s current parameters, the distribution of the contamination, and details of the remediation process. While Cassidy was unable to answer most of them – due to the fact that any answers would have been based on information that she did not yet have: the results of the investigation that the EPA will conduct if the site is added to the

NPL – she did delve further into how the process works.

Noting that the EPA’s preliminary investigation was done with the sole goal of surpassing the qualifying guidelines of an NPL site while using easily identified boundaries, Cassidy – in responding to one question – answered a bunch of others, while also touching on the as of yet unknown actual scope of the project:

“The way you define a site is wherever the contamination has come to be located, so the actual definition changes as the investigation proceeds,” she said of the early stages of what she anticipated would be a years-long project. “So, again, we won’t know the final site

boundaries for a long time because we need to complete our entire investigation.”

nance sheds for the newly converted LNG bus fleet replacing the old diesel buses. This replaced the outdated Bartlett bus yard that was closed and the land subsequently sold.

Opened in 2003, these temporary LNG terminals will reach their retirement date in 2028, according to Hamwey. He said that the Arborway Yard is the third largest bus facility of the nine in operation between Lynn and Quincy.

“Bus transit is a much bigger focus than it was,” he said, adding that the Arborway Yard bus routes serve a ridership that is 28 percent low income and 55 percent people of color, among the highest percentages in the system.

Hamwey said that the MBTA owns two properties on the 19-acre site, the bus yard itself plus the 500 Arborway building. The planned bus yard also includes the City’s old DPW light yard that was removed in March and relocated in April 2014 to American Legion Highway.

An agreement signed in 2001 during the stalled first phase of the bus yard planning called for the city to transfer the corner lot to the MBTA for bus yard expansion.

Boston DPW may have other plans.

In a June 14, 2021 presentation to the Stony Brook Neighborhood Association (SNA), staff from the city DPW waste reduction division said it was preparing the site with grading and asphalt for a proposed recycling site that would take hazardous and bulk waste including old TV’s, air conditioners and mattresses as well as food waste and light bulbs.

In a diagram displayed of the planned bus yard Hamwey said the plan is designed to meet operation requirements but also to maximize the space allocated for development.

The diagram shows the garage aligned with the Casey Arborway at the curb cut built into the parkway at the bike and walk path, and 500 Arborway is retained.

In 2014 the MBTA said it would raze the building, but this changed in 2019 when engineering offices moved in from the Transportation Building and a new curb cut and driveway - not in the original parkway plans - was built off the Casey Arborway.

In the diagram, the lighting division yard is shown as employee parking and a thick boundary buffer of trees have been added along Lotus and Washington Streets.

The wide curb cut nearly opposite Orchardhill Road was built over the protests of the Emerald Necklace Conservancy, which in 2004, objected to any bus access onto the parkway. This debate stalled the Arborway Committee process from which it never recovered.

In what could be the understatement of the decade Hamwey said, “There’s been a lot of discussion over the last quarter century. We have the need now for a larger facility for advanced modernization of the site to accommodate electric infrastructure and employee parking.”

Hamwey said the new facility would accommodate 40-foot and 60-foot-long buses as well as move the number 39 and the number 32 [Hyde Park at Cleary Square] to The Arborway and upgrade that for a 60-foot bus.

“There’s more room at the Arborway,” he said. “We’re playing around, swapping things around trying to find the logical way to lay it out. We’re preserving as much space as we can so development can occur on Washington Street.”

The Quincy bus yard has capacity for 86 diesel buses and is in the design stage now, Hamwey said.

He explained that the start of Arborway construction would coincide with the opening of the Quincy facility. He said the power would be supplied to individual charging stations for the buses.

In summary, Hamwey said there were five main goals:

- Prioritizing and building at one the largest and most centrally located urban core facilities.

- Upgrade a facility that serves routes serving the greatest share of bus ridership and design them to absorb high ridership from the new development being built around the Arborway bus yard.

- Upgrade a facility that serves bus routes with the most low income and households of color.

- Provide zero emissions with quiet electric buses.

- The new facility will allow for more 60 foot articulated buses.

Kevin Rainsford has been an active advocate for the Arborway yard since joining the neighborhood council in 2016. He organized the “Sweet 16 Party” in April 2017, a not very tongue-in-cheek critique of 15 years of effort for a promised new bus yard with development on redundant land.

Rainsford worked behind the scenes to coordinate the MBTA presentation with the neighborhood council.

“This will be the first electric bus facility in the city,” Rainsford told The Bulletin the next day.

The Arborway process began with Former Mayor Tom Menino when most people taking part in the call didn’t live in the neighborhood, but for the very few who were involved back then there was a sigh of skepticism when Hamwey read the timeline; he expected the completion date to be the end of 2027.

“But that depends on funding in the Capital Improvement Plan,” Hamwey added.

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

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
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
