## Residents voice concerns over proposed WR cannabis shop

A community meeting was held for the proposed recreational cannabis establishment, Lowkey Dispensary LLC, on Apr. 26. The retail recreational cannabis dispensary would be operated at 5252-5270 Washington St.

Around 40 community members were present at the Zoom meeting, which was hosted by West Roxbury Office of Neighborhood Services (ONS) liaison Jake Lacey. The meeting included a presentation of the proposal and public comments. “This is an open comment period. This is not a

debate on the legalization or morality of marijuana,” Lacey said. “No final decisions about this proposal are being made tonight.”

The presentation opened with Founder and CEO of Lowkey, Jeff Similien and business partner Robert Nichols introducing themselves and the project. Similien said he was raised in Dorchester and graduated from West Roxbury High School, and is a graduate of Curry College. He is a Real Estate Broker and a part of Youth Build Boston.

“Lowkey is a recreational cannabis retail brand in Boston,” he said. “We aim to work

with communities that have been disproportionately harmed by the past prohibition of cannabis to ensure their inclusion in the legal cannabis industry. Our long-term goal is to be a fully integrated company that cultivates, processes and delivers to our retail stores and retail partners. Our vision is to provide high quality crafted cannabis to our community while maintaining our commitment to social justice.”

Similien discussed the proposed location, 5252-5270 Washington St. in West Roxbury. The zoning is compliant with city bylaws, and the

## Boston Calling to limit noise

### All sound to be handled by festival staff and not bands

The Allston Civic Association (ACA) met with community members, Boston Calling representative Kristen Franks and Boston Calling Founder Brian Appel on Wednesday, April 20 in a virtual format.

Franks said this year’s festival has undergone some changes in terms of lineup and said the team is now working on community impact mitigation.

“Our top priority with the festival has always been public safety and we’ve enjoyed a great working relationship with District D-14 and all of the Boston Police Department (BPD), as well as the state police, Cambridge police, the MBTA police, Harvard police, and we’re widely considered one of the

## JP Housing Committee being more proactive

A sense of militancy appears to be seeping into the Jamaica Plain housing committee.

Long content with reviewing development proposals, it now seems to be taking a more proactive role. Housing committee chair Marvin Mathelier summed it up at the April 19 virtual meeting as “a call to action.”

At the April monthly meeting, longtime housing committee member Kathy Brown, who is also director of the Boston Tenant Coalition, introduced “a new campaign to strengthen the city’s inclusionary de-

establishment is over 1,000 feet from the nearest school and over 500 feet from the nearest church.

Nichols and Similien also spoke about community impacts. These positive impacts include 20-30 full-time and part-time jobs available to West Roxbury residents, prioritizing the utilization of local contractors, suppliers, vendors, and employees, \$250,000 over a five-year period earmarked for community education, drug abuse prevention and public health/safety matters, and business development coaching.

“We will establish a community board of directors that will meet quarterly, whose sole purpose is to ensure the funds are allocated where they are needed most. The board will be made up of seven members, including one seat for a Lowkey Dispensary executive. All other seats will require a community nomination/voting process as each community group sees fit,” explained Similien.

An important part of the presentation was the safety plan. Nichols and Similien discussed working with police officers to ensure safety.

“We have a zero tolerance policy against individuals under 21 years of age obtaining cannabis,” Nichols said. “We will maintain live outdoor

camera feeds to prevent diversion to minors on our premises.”

Lowkey’s verification process includes all store visitors being required to present their I.D. before entering the secured merchandise floor, each customer I.D. being verified, a community/business contract to hold customers accountable, and asking for I.D. before finalizing a purchase.

After the presentation, Similien and Nichols took questions and comments from meeting attendees. Joe Galante of Emerald Cleaners asked why Lowkey is planning on opening several locations in the Boston area at once. Nichols explained that when applying for the licenses, that “it’s not a sure bet.”

“We had to put several applications out there, not knowing which ones were going to go through. Our Dorchester location should be open in the next three months or so. Even if we get approved soon, the West Roxbury location may not open for two years or so,” he said.

Community member Sarah Breuer asked if Lowkey planned to have bike racks, and if the recreational facility would provide deals for medical patients. Nichols responded that they “absolutely” plan on having bike racks, and

plans on having the parking lot as convenient for customers as possible. He also explained that there will be no discounts for medical patients since they plan on being a recreational facility only.

Another community member raised concerns about “many people dealing in the area, and many people loitering in their cars and smoking.”

“I don’t know if you would call that your competition, but you say there’s gonna be the police department around, but they’re not even around to see what’s going on at the playground,” the resident said. “With the Boston Police Department (BPD) being short-staffed, I don’t think you’re going to get the support you need.”

Another neighbor stated they were concerned that “people will pick up some of [Lowkey’s] products, go across the street to the park, use it there and have a negative influence on the children.”

Other community members applauded Nichols and Similien’s thorough presentation, and one neighbor asked how they could become involved with community support for the project.

# ERNA reviews a two-family plan

The East River Neighborhood Association met on Monday, April 11 and the big discussion of the evening concerned a proposal for a two-family home at 18 Birchcroft Rd. from Ennaya Said through his representative, former Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council member Kyle Smith.

Said said he wants to tear down the current single-family home there – which even as of 2019 was dilapidated to the point where the roof had holes and the inside of the home was exposed to the open air – and put in a two-

family home. While the two-family part of the plan is allowed, residents balked at the two units, one of which had four bedrooms and the other had five bedrooms.

Residents were also concerned over the sight lines of the proposed roof deck affecting the privacy of neighbors. The proposal would need zoning relief for several reasons, including that the lot is 4,000 square feet where the area requires 5,000 square feet or larger (according to the Boston Assessing Depart-

ment, the building was built in 1945, before zoning). It would also need relief for insufficient lot area, insufficient parking, excessive building height in stories (three proposed two required), excessive building height in feet, insufficient front, rear and side

# On sacred ground


Sooner or later, we knew that it would come. It was inexorable just as the next high tide at Tenean Beach. With declining numbers it was inevitable that the Poor Clare nuns would discern that it was time to move from their convent at Murray Circle (some locals insist on calling the roundabout the "Poor Clares' Rotary"), where the Arborway, Jamaica Way, and Centre Street all intersect. This move is in the offing, with the resulting question being, what is going to happen to the magnificent building on the 2.88-acre site.

Built in 1933-1934, the edifice has been maintained on a shoe-string budget in modern years. Having taken vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, the nuns have opted not to update the building beyond what is required for safety and basic amenities. The convent, once housing as many as 65 nuns, is somewhat spartan—that's the nature of their living:

sometimes such rooms are called "cells," not because of any jail-like characteristics. Such simple and small rooms are a place for members of this contemplative order to pray, sleep, and do spiritual reading who in their silence prioritize worship over other good works.

Currently a number of groups are haggling over what is to become of the property: The Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council, JP Housing Committee, Boston Landmarks Commission, among others, are striving for mayoral approval for their interests. Holland Development, following the requests of the religious order, wants to demolish it altogether. The razing of it would make the building of 26 condos easier, rather than modify it and to let it be for the most part, following the advice of Pope Francis in his encyclical "Laudate Si," calling for less impact on the environment.

In any event, this walled-

off ground abutting the Arborway is truly sacred ground. It was here that women gave themselves in prayer and anonymity to follow the rules of St. Clare and worship our Creator 24-7, 365, over the many decades. yard and insufficient usable open space.

Residents wanted to know why Said needed a two-family with all those bedrooms, and he said he is moving in there with his family and his mother, and they need the extra space.

Said said he would return to the neighborhood with something smaller that he hoped would alleviate neighbors' concerns.

"We're going to have a two-family, but it's going to be much smaller," he said. "It'll be just like any other two-family on Blake Street, or even smaller."

In other news, Boston Police Department (BPD) Community Service Officer for District E-18 Paul Broderick went through the police report for the neighborhood. He said for assaults, March 14 saw an incident on River Street at 1 p.m. when the suspect broke into the victim's house with a fire extinguisher. The suspect accused the victim of posting the victim's name on an online escort profile.

On March 25, Broderick reported that at around 7:20 p.m. on Wood Avenue officers found a victim claiming her boyfriend had assaulted her at her apartment. For larcenies, Broderick reported an incident on March 31 in which

the victim stated his tires were stolen during the night. He said the vehicle was left on milk crates. A teacher at the Boston Prep Charter School also reported her wallet was stolen from her office on April 6.

Broderick also reported a robbery at Logan Square on March 22 at the ZNR Convenience Store where victim stated a male pointed a gun at him, took \$200 from the register, his store key and his car.

Broderick reported no drug incidents or breaking and entering incidents. He did say that from this time last year, Hyde Park crime is up 7 percent, but that there is a good reason for that.

"The majority of that 7 percent is auto thefts," he said. "So last year at this time we only had one, but we currently have 21 now. The majority of those auto thefts are people who went out to their car, started it up with the key, went back in the house to wait for it to warm up and somebody jumped in the car and drove off with it. It's happened at people's homes and it happened when people run into a restaurant to get their food and they come out and their car is stolen."

Broderick said it's probably better to brave the cold.

"You can't be letting your car run unattended," he said.

One resident also asked about speeding and construction at the intersection of Wood Avenue and Westminster Avenue. The resident, who was listed as Rande in the virtual format, asked why there was no police detail at the road construction site. She also said drivers were moving the detour signs from the construction site so they could speed down Wood Ave. BPD Sgt. Daniel Keene explained that because the state requires police officers for traffic details, sometimes there are just not enough officers to go around.

"I'm sure the company called in the detail but some jobs just go unfilled," he said. "There's just sometimes more jobs than officers available to do them."

He said they have a traffic car in that location sometimes, but current staffing issues make it difficult.

"Every neighborhood group wants traffic enforcement in certain areas and we try to spread them out through the whole district and with our manpower we're lucky to have just one car some nights," he said. "We will continue to enforce when we can."

velopment policy (IDP).”  
 “The housing committee in the past has had an active role,” she said. “I’d like to ask if it can be more active in this campaign to improve the IDP policy so that developers can make more affordable units.”

“We want to lower the trigger to five or six units,” Brown said. “And lower the affordability to 60 percent.”

Brown said that a new study is planned by the mayor’s office. “The mayor will announce the [IDP] feasibility study and also look at housing needs and fair housing issues,” she said.

The CTAB policy request was put up on the screen to share. It read: “The IDP We Need: 33 percent of new development to be affordable. Affordable means a range of 40 percent AMI for renters and 50 to 100 percent for home ownership. All affordable units to be permanently affordable.”

“Right now the city’s IDP requirement is 13 percent of the units,” said Brown. “The Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Council (JPNC) has requested 25 percent. We want 20 percent city-wide.

“It’s scattered right now city-wide. Plan Nubian Square is one third affordable... But it’s only an executive order,” Brown said. “If the mayor doesn’t like it, it goes away. Our goal is to put the executive order into the zoning code.”

Brown pointed to Allston Brighton as a ground zero neighborhood.

“There’s a crazy amount of development there,” she said. “There is a lack of affordability and not taking fair housing seriously.”

As if on cue, and on the eve of the council hearing Mayor Wu announced the next morning that two consulting firms had been

hired to study the city’s IDP program in collaboration with a new eleven-person advisory committee.

David Paul Rosen Associates will study the IDP program with an eye toward increasing the percentage of income-restricted units.

Rosen did a similar study for the City of Cambridge.

A second firm, Karl F Seidman, will analyze the commercial linkage program. No one from Jamaica Plain is on the advisory committee although one key member is Leslie Reid, executive director of Madison Park CDC, who has a long professional career with the JPNDP going back over 20 years.

Brown and Horsley are taking the lead in the Poor Sisters of St Clare property which seems to be on hold.

“We had some good news,” Horsley said. “The Boston Landmarks Commission (BLC) hearing [April 12] was postponed. The Sisters aren’t ready. It looks like it’s going to be on either May 10 or June 14.”

Celeste Walker, who lives nearby, said that according to Rosanne Foley of the BLC “it had only been tentatively on the agenda and was taken off.”

Horsley said that there have been “multiple contacts with elected officials” about the property.

“Historic Boston Inc. (HBI) is supporting us,” she said. “Sally Zimmerman is doing research with them. Sally is an expert around landmark studies. It’s great to have her.”

According to Horsley, Zimmerman is preparing a petition to give to the landmark commission showing that the building has historic status.”

HBI executive director

Kathy Kottaridis spoke with the Bulletin the next day.

“Sally has done reconnaissance research for HBI so that we understand the history of the building and understand its significance in the event there is need for HBI’s assistance, which no one has discussed... we might play a role in preserving something a private developer would find difficult. Sally is not preparing a Landmark petition. Landmark organizing is not an HBI thing.”

Another petition being prepared by committee member Jaya Aiyer from Wenham Street is in draft form and includes asking for more affordability and community process.

Walker said that the BLC “doesn’t have to have a [demo delay] hearing.

“People in the neighborhood are very sad about this,” she said. “Some have long personal ties with the Sisters for generations. They understand the Sisters’ needs and are aware of the conditions of the building. It will take millions to buy the building and millions to make the building habitable.”

Walker said that other developers had a walk-through of the property including a “philanthropist.” The Arboretum has a vested interest in this. Unfortunately, Harvard wouldn’t buy the property.”

“Other nonprofits weren’t asked,” Brown said. “This would be perfect for Health Care for the Homeless,” and said the property is “a JP asset.”

“Affordable housing is so needed. Jamaica Hills has the least amount of affordable housing.”

Citing unnamed sources Brown added, “The city doesn’t think this is a done deal.”

safest festivals in the country,” Franks said. “We’re extremely excited to be back. We’ve been working with several nonprofits and we’ve given out hundreds and hundreds of tickets. If there’s any nonprofit around that I haven’t spoken with please drop me a line. We’re always looking to create new partnerships.”

One major concern of residents of past festivals has been noise escaping the confines of the festival and spilling out into the neighborhoods. Appel said in the past that has been due to performers’ sound engineers going over their prescribed limits, and that this year that will hopefully not be a problem.

“We have spent a lot of time and a lot of calories on noise mitigation,” he said. “In 2019 we did have some challenges with a couple of the artists just blowing through our sound limitations and causing some fairly significant disturbances in the local communities. This is obviously a front-and-center concern for us and so for this year we’ve had every single artist, up to and including Metallica, agree to our sound decibel limitations and that means there will be a reduction in

volume at all stages.”

Appel said they will have their own team controlling sound levels instead of each band’s own sound engineer. “This will make sure any band that goes over our DB limits gets brought right back in line by our engineers and not the bands’ engineers,” he said.

Appel said they will also be opening later and closing earlier. He also said they booked 18 regional acts to cater to the local music scene.

Another issue Franks said she wanted to address is that of transportation after the event. She said they work closely with the MBTA and the audience to make sure participants take full advantage of the buses and Green Line.

“What also worked really well in 2019 was using the Harvard Business School as our rideshare lot,” she said. “And it was Geosquared so people couldn’t be showing up on the side streets in Allston or Brighton to get picked up; they’d have to go to this one spot and we plan on doing that again. The only thing that’s different this year is we’ve discovered there is a national shortage of drivers as far as rideshare is concerned. It’s another industry that’s been affected by COVID and

we’re going to continue to message to urge them to take the T and not rely on Uber or Lyft.”

Franks added they are working with the MBTA to increase the number of MBTA 66 Line buses during the show. she also said there will be a community hotline activated the week before the show, and any resident with concerns, questions or complaints during or before the show can call in.

“We do like to also give a schedule for when we have sound checks, and we have a flyer notifying residents that we mail to, over 5,000 households in Allston, Brighton and Cambridge, and we plan to do that again this year,” she said.



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
