Shaw Memorial rededicated after restoration

On June 1, residents, officials and members of the 54th Volunteer Regiment Company A re-dedicated the Robert Gould Shaw and 54th Massachusetts Regiment Memorial on the Boston Common, after a \$3 million restoration project.

The National Park Service, the City of Boston, the Friends of the Public Garden, and the Museum of African-American History Boston-Nantucket partnered to restore it, starting in 2018. It was originally unveiled on May 31, 1897, at a ceremony attended by Harriet Tubman and Booker T. Washington, as

well as some of the surviving members of the 54th. The 54th Massachusetts Regiment was formed in February of 1863, after the Emancipation Proclamation authorized African-Americans to serve in the Union Army.

Wednesday's event saw numerous speakers, who focused on the importance of the monument to understanding African-American history as well as inspiring future generations.

"Education is the prime mission of preserving our collective history," said Robert Stanton, former Director of the National Parks Service.

"It's the greatest work of public art in the United States, and I've seen a lot of them," said Dr. David Blight, profes-

sor of American History at Yale University. Gov. Charlie Baker said he sees tourists stopping to look at the memorial and hopes that they will continue to learn about its importance.

Dr. Ibram Kendi, who serves as the founding director of the Boston University Center for Antiracist Research, said "the black soldiers were as much the Great Emancipator as Abraham Lincoln," noting that most war memorials depict a single man, but this one does not. The memorial was created by Augustus Saint-Gaudens, a notable sculptor who worked on many Civil War memorials. He originally intended to

Celebrating new housing at Jackson Square

"Action at Jackson" was the cry in 2001 when Urban Edge, under Mossik Hacobian, bought the old Webb Manufacturing building and the adjacent abandoned Eliot Motors Ford dealership at 1542 Columbus Ave.

The then Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA)-led Jackson Square planning group process was kicked into high gear. In 2013 the Boston Globe crowned Jackson Square as "the new destination."

In 2006 Urban Edge moved its home office from Egleston Square - where it had been located since 1983 - to the Webb Building and joined a partnership designated by the BRA after it rezoned the 6.5 acres around the Jackson Square Orange Line station on June 1, 2005.

The partnership was the Community Builders (TCB), Urban Edge and The Jamaica Plain Neighborhood Development Corporation (JPND) and on June 1, 2022 the partnership convened 17 years later to celebrate the transformation of Jackson Square and three new residential buildings.

On June 1, Teronda Ellis, executive director of JPND, introduced the completion, under-construction and near-groundbreaking of the three residences totaling 119 one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments, most below market-rate; a large proportion dedicated to those earning 30 percent area median income (AMI).

The 25 Amory St. project, built by JPND and designed by Icon Architects, is 44 units and residents began moving in between February and April 2022, includ-

Corrib 5K makes triumphant return

Residents, runners and onlookers all said on Sunday that they were happy to see the 28th Corrib 5K and Fun Run return to its rightful place in June.

The day was a bit hot, but that didn't stop more than 1,100 runners from getting their bibs and more than 800 residents coming out to cheer them on. The day was full of music, lawn games, in-

only sculpt Shaw, but later decided to add members of the regiment, taking 14 years for him to complete. It was one of the first monuments depicting African-American soldiers in the United States.

Lieutenant General Gary Brito, a black man from Hyannis, spoke about how the

54th Massachusetts paved the way for future generations of African-American soldiers. He said, "soldiers of all walks of life voluntarily raise their hands to defend this great nation. The color of one's skin should not be a barrier to patriotic service."

The first African-American

man to receive the Medal of Honor was a member of the 54th, William Carney, who did not let the regiment's flag touch the ground during a particularly fierce battle and being shot. Blight said that the Latin inscription on the monument is translated as 'He gave up everything to serve the Republic,' and asked the audience: "What are we giving up for the Republic?"

The 54th recruited not only men from Massachusetts, but from all over the country, including men who had escaped from slavery in the South. The regiment trained at Camp Meigs in what is now Hyde Park and what was then Dedham. Camp Meigs was used by numerous Massachusetts regiments starting in 1861. It was located next to Sprague Pond in Readville and had railroad tracks already there, mak-

ing mass transportation to and from the site easy.

The 54th was the subject of much scrutiny at the time, but received strong praise from contemporaries, such as William Dale, Massachusetts Surgeon General, who said, "a more robust, strong, and healthy set of men were never mustered into the service of the United States." Many people went to visit the camp to observe the then-unusual existence of African-American soldiers.

The leader of the 54th was Robert Gould Shaw, a white colonel from West Roxbury whose family were prominent abolitionists. The monument depicts them marching down Beacon Street to the naval ship that was to take them to Charleston, South Carolina, in 1863. Frederick Douglass shook every man's hand, including two of his own sons. Many members of the unit died at Fort Wagner in July 1863, including Shaw.

The Confederates buried Shaw in an unmarked grave with his soldiers, which they saw as an insult to a white officer; however, Shaw's family saw it as an honor.

In 2008, Gov. Deval Patrick formed a 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Regiment, a ceremonial unit of the Massachusetts Army National Guard. Members of this regiment were present at the re-dedication. There were also members of the group that re-enacts the original regiment. First Sgt. Gerard Grimes said he's been a member of the Mass. 54th re-enactors for 23 years, after learning his 5th great uncle was a member of the original unit.

"It opened my eyes to the history of the black soldier," he said, adding that he never learned about it in the Boston Public Schools. At New England re-enactment events, the Mass. 54th is usually the only black regiment. They have done about 15 events so far this year.

Rozzie Farmers Market returns

More than a thousand people attended the grand return of the Roslindale Farmers Market at Adams Park and Birch St. Plaza on June 4. The Roslindale Village Main Street (RVMS) Summer Farmers Market will take place every Saturday, 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., throughout the summer and fall until Nov. 19.

The RVMS Farmers Market is one of Boston's most prominent neighborhood farmers markets, with around 30 vendors. The new Executive Director of RVMS, Anna VanRemoortel, said she was actually a first-timer at the event. "This is my first opening day. It's really exciting because for so long we've been in the pandemic, where we haven't been able to have a large Farmers Market," she said. "This means so much to the community. It's not only about supporting the vendors; it's also about supporting our fellow Rozzidents and the small business owners here. I encourage people to come every Saturday and enjoy this community space we have."

The market did take place last year, but was greatly scaled back due to COVID concerns.

There were many activities for kids, including circus acts, acrobatics, a clown, magic, bubbles, and more. Wild Pops, which was selling homemade popsicles in a variety of flavors,

appeared to be a huge hit among children.

"I thought Davey the Clown was hilarious. The way he made all the kids laugh made the whole thing even funnier and more enjoyable. It's hard to choose one [favorite] thing, but seeing your neighbors having fun, meeting new people, and getting to know local vendors really makes you feel happy in the community," said community member Lauren Coral.

"My favorite part of the Roslindale Farmers Market is talking with the vendors and finding out the stories behind the products and produce that they're selling," remarked Roslindale community member Jessica Mink.

"Since the start of the market 30 years ago, it has generated \$4 million for for both local and regional vendors as well as Roslindale businesses. The RVMS Farmers Market is also a food access point for all. The market will continue to have Summer Eats Meals sponsored by Project Bread and the YMCA, which offers free meals to young people under 18. In addition, the market will continue to serve SNAP/EBT and farmers market coupon recipients," RVMS states in its description of the event.

Many dogs (and a few cats) attended the market with their owners.

The vendors include Brookford Farm, The Neighbor-

hood Farm, Lilac Hedge Farm, Hillside Mushrooms, Beverly Bees, Rozzie Buzz Coffee, Wild Pops, Fieldstone Kombucha, Hapi African Gourmet, Mei Mei Dumplings, Boston Smoked Fish Co, Amy's Own CBD Oils, and much, much more.

Sponsors of the market include The Muncey Group, Sazama Real Estate, and The Cooperative Bank. Free parking is available at the lower Roslindale Village Commuter Rail lot and the municipal lot off South Street. Attendees are encouraged to (when possible) walk, bike, and use public transportation when traveling to the market. flatable contraptions of every sort and free food from the Kennedy Kitchen.

“Thank you everyone for coming out, especially the volunteers and the runners and anybody who helps make this such a special event, thank you so much we really appreciate you,” said Corrib manager Tony Bligh. “I’m hopeful that everyone will take a moment of silence for people that we’ve lost. It’s been a very difficult year, and I hope everyone takes a moment to think of everyone we’ve lost to COVID-19 this past year.”

Bligh introduced retired Catholic Memorial icon Tom Maher to start the race. “Retiring after 50 years, and so thanks for the B-plus!” he said with a laugh.

Emcee Thomas Doherty, or TD as he’s known around town, said the Corrib Charitable Trust has raised and distributed \$1.6 million for local charities in the Parkway, including Rose’s Bounty Food Pantry and the Parkway YMCA.

Boston Mayor Michelle Wu was at the event, and said she was glad to see such a huge spirit of cooperation in the Parkway community. “Every generation, all the families out here, you’re supporting your community and the Corrib 5K and for our city,” she said. “I am honored to be here, we have a perfect, beautiful day for this and I hope all the runners have a wonderful day.”

At-Large City Councilor Ruthzee Louijeune said she was happy to be gathering again. “Have fun and go Celtics!” she said.

Kendra Lara said this was her second time at the event and she couldn’t believe how much good comes out of the race.

“Our neighborhoods and our young people and our community need so many resources, and the Corrib Pub has basically, for about 28 years, taken it upon themselves to host this community event, to raise money and make sure that they’re financially supporting all the things we need to do,” she said. “We are grateful at the city level that people in our communities really take charge in that way and that’s what makes our city vi-

brant.”

Resident Cliff Jones said he was invited by some coworkers a few years ago and continued to go because he felt it was a good cause, even though he said he’s not really a runner. “The course is not too bad,” he said. “So it can’t be too bad if I can do it, but I’d say the best way to figure it out is to just run it for yourself!”

Residents Jack McDonough and Kevin Parker said they have been coming to volunteer at the race for well over a decade. They do it to support the neighborhood, as well as Lord Mayor of West Roxbury Richie Gormley. They said it has always been a family affair.

“This is all community-related, and nobody’s making any money and for 25 years people have been coming together to do this,” McDonough said. “I ran this when I first came to the neighborhood and my kids have run it and they’re now in college and will do it when they come back. All the people you see organizing it, their kids have gone through the process.”


Rose’s Bounty volunteer Linda Denekamp said they’ve had people coming to the booth all day to learn about the different programs the pantry provides, whether it’s backpacks for school children or meals for veterans. “We’re getting a good response here, and obviously some people are very in tune with what the Pantry is doing and the Corrib Charitable Trust, and of course the Corrib has been sponsoring us for years,” she said.

Mamabeasts Founder Antoinette Hemphill and her group had about 15 runners in the race in their ninth official appearance at the event. Hemphill said the group was created to help moms get in shape in a supportive and caring environment. “We run the Corrib every year as a way to celebrate our month-long Mad May challenge,” she said. “This is sort of our first year that we had a running club to train for this race. It’s a great way to get the Mamas out and socialize and have some fun.”

Residents Mike Demello and Faith Castigiline came out from Hyde Park to do the race for the third time. “It’s a really fun time; it’s fun to be outside, even if it’s a little hot,” he said. “The noon start time is not as ideal as it could be, but at least you don’t have to wake up early!”

To be a kid again and out for the summer!

During these magnificent days of this first summer month, we have to ask in the style of James Russell Lowell, “What is so rare as a day in June?/Then, if after, come perfect days.” And with schools preparing to close for the summer—and they should do so earlier in the month rather than later because only marginal learning in schools during the month of June—I can’t help but think of another poem learned in my youth: John Greenleaf Whittier’s ode to summertime as viewed by a school-age youngster:



My Kind of Town/

[Note: the last day of school for Boston Public Schools students is June 27.]

*Blessings on thee, little man, Bare-foot boy, with cheek of tan!
Ah! that thou couldst know thy joy,
Ere it passes, barefoot boy!”*

In between these pairs of rhyming lines—the beginning and end of the long testimonial to summertime boyhood—John Greenleaf Whittier details all the joys and curiosities of being a young boy once June has arrived with its celebratory end-of-the-schComposed in 1855 in an era when shoes were hard to come by—predating inexpensive flip-flops, non-designer sandals, and non-celebrity endorsed sneakers—the poem delineates myriad activities, many concerned with the intricacies of Mother Nature, for young boys in an era devoid of Little League, CYO, and soccer/lacrosse camps. [Lest the poem be discarded by some for being totally male-oriented, that list of Whittier’s summer activities—none with organized sports or going to the mall or playing with video games—could be and should be investigated by girls also.]

It was a much simpler age when one of Haverhill’s favorite sons crafted the idyllic. Many of us, even in an urban environment, would bother mothers with an “I’m bored” a few days after the last day of school (usually early-to-middle June) to which a command was frequently uttered to go outside to play. Lying down on your back to stare at the ever-changing cloud formations was the default. OK, OK, Whittier’s barefoot lad—probably around 10 or 11 years old—led a carefree life once summer began. In spite of the pastoral setting, there were no farm chores to be done and no siblings to be cared for. In short there were no worries. What a life! No wonder Whittier concludes with the admonition that he better appreciate the moment/age before it passes. I’m not sure I ever did.

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Sprague Pond, Crane Ledge top HPNA agenda

River Street Bridge still closed for inspection

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) gathered for its monthly meeting at the Municipal Building/BCYF (Boston Center for Youth and Families) at 1179 River St. The meeting ran just over an hour and a quarter and drew about 25 people.

The evening's featured guest was Parks and Recreation Department Senior Planner Aldo Ghirin, who gave a basic overview of the City's Seven Year Open Space Plan. This will be an update of its current version and, in addition to being a comprehensive index of the city's park system, it will present future improvements to it. A survey regarding the plan will run until June 15. To take it, visit www.boston.gov/open-space.

Ghirin also previewed an upcoming City Council hearing regarding its authorization of the Parks Commission to take, by eminent domain, a one acre site on Sprague Pond in the Readville section of Hyde

Park. If approved, fair market value damages would be awarded to the owners, and a conservation restriction would be conveyed to the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation (SWBCDC).

Sprague Pond has been granted great pond status by the Commonwealth, and is one of only two in the city (Jamaica Pond is the other). Hidden behind houses and light industrial businesses along Sprague Street as it approaches the Dedham line, it is the last undeveloped area of Camp Meigs, training ground for Civil War soldiers including

the famed 54th Regiment. It was also part of the home ground of the Massachusetts tribe.

The Sprague Pond authorization hearing is scheduled for Thursday, June 9 beginning at 10 a.m. in the Ianella Chamber of City Hall. It is docket 0653 on the agenda for the City Council Committee on Environmental Justice & Resiliency & Parks. The public can attend and testify in person, on Zoom, or in writing. 

ing Esther Belliard who was one of the morning speakers.

The building at 250 Centre St., adjoining 25 Amory, is separated by a parking lot and sitting plaza and is under construction on the 1.5-acre lot.

This is a six-story, 110-unit building with a dramatic, tall, wide-window accordion prow facing Centre Street that has been a long time coming. Icon Architects and The Community Builders made their first public presentation in November 2015 but was delayed in part because a five-foot diameter culvert carrying Stony Brook had to be relocated in 2017.

Andrew Waxman, Regional Vice President of TCB said in his remarks that 250 Centre St. "shows the inclusiveness" of the partnership because of the wide range of income levels, 44 of which are offered to those earning between 30 percent and 60 percent AMI.

The third residential building, at 1599 Columbus Ave. is developed by Urban Edge and designed by Utile Architects. It will have two sides, the Columbus Avenue front and the other facing Amory Street. As first reported by The Bulletin, 1599 Columbus Ave. is a six-story, 65-unit, fully-affordable residence replacing two, low-scale light industrial buildings acquired by Urban Edge in 2016 and 2018.

Urban Edge received Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) approval on Dec. 12, 2019 and zoning approval on Jan. 14, 2020.

Emilio Dorcelly, executive director of Urban Edge, said that ground has not yet been broken on 1599 Columbus as funding is being worked on and permits drawn up.

"But all units are affordable and 30 percent, or 22 units, will be for those earning 30 percent AMI," Dorcelly said.

"There's no ground breaking yet but we came up with a novel idea," he said. "A time capsule. Over the next few months we'll invite people to take your own thoughts and memories and write them down and put them into the time capsule that will be opened in 50 years, in 2074 when Urban Edge will be 100 years old."

Dorcelly pointed to a circular container on a side table and invited people to add their messages to it.

Ellis said the celebration was bringing "this long-standing effort to the finish line." Referring to the ill-fated I-95, Ellis said, "The people had a vision for their neighborhood. We got our way this time."

Ellis pointed to the new street that enters the 250 Centre/ 25 Amory quad from Amory Street, built in 2019 by abutting property owner Boston Community Ventures, after long negotiations with JPND. "That new street is called People's Way," she said.

Jennifer Maddox, undersecretary of the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), a major funder of the two buildings, agreed with Ellis.

"This is truly a celebration," she said in her remarks, "a celebration of the people."

Also speaking was Sheila Dillon, chief of the Mayor's Office of Housing (originally DND), another major funder; she was followed by the new director of the BPDA Arthur Jemison.

In his first public remarks, Jemison asked the 100 people at the ceremony to turn around. "Look at this audience," he said. "There's a generation of housing talent all in one place. People said 'We can do this. Not sure how but we're going to do this vision.'" Ellis described part of that vision.

"It's for all the new people who will make up the new Jackson Square," she said, noting the destruction of hundreds of homes in the wake of I-95, Ellis described the other half of the vision.

"We're building buildings to bring the people back to Jackson Square," she said.

Dorcelly told the audience how the vision became a reality.

"It's not possible without partners," he said. "The Community Builders, JPND and Urban Edge. The collective input of all three."

There was much talk during the ceremony about the past, or what neighborhood speaker Willie Mitchell called 'remembering.'

Dorcelly reminded the audience to remember who came before. "Mossik Hacobian, Richard Thall of JPND and Crystal Kornegay when she was at Urban Edge," he said. "They saw what did not exist."

But Dorcelly wanted to know "what's coming next?"

"The real transformation is here [at Jackson Square]," he said. "Not in the Seaport or Downtown. I daresay there's not too many places that can look and see what can be developed in the next ten years. This is just a start. Let's figure out what's next."

Ghirin was asked about access to Sprague Pond via an abutting urban wild currently encroached upon by the Gioioso construction company (50 Sprague St.). This City owned land would provide a direct path to the proposed park and pond. Noting that it is a narrow piece of property that would not be very visible from the street, he added that – with construction equipment surrounding it – it may also be unsafe.

Later in the meeting, after Ghirin had left, open space and preservation activist Frank O’Brien – who has been involved in the Sprague Pond process – stated that when he had brought the urban wild property to the attention of the PRD to see if something could be done about moving the construction equipment, “all they did was take it off the urban wilds list.” Laughing, he went on. “That was the way they solved the problem.”

Reached for comment, Ghirin explained that an urban wild is not an official designation until the City or Commonwealth acquires it for that purpose; he also noted that the land is under the control of the Mayor’s Office of Housing (formerly the Department of Neighborhood Development). Continuing, he alluded to the

BPDA (Boston Planning & Development Agency) approved 36-40 Sprague St. application to reiterate something that he had said at the meeting: that it made more sense to try to leverage the broadening of the City owned access route as part of any planning process for that development.

The portion of the 36-40 Sprague St. project that would have included the encroached upon urban wild access route was removed from its BPDA application in March, 2019.

In his comments, O’Brien also offered suggestions for the preservation of Crane Ledge Woods. The undeveloped 24 acre plateau is behind the shopping mall on American Legion Highway at the point where Hyde Park, Roslindale, and Mattapan meet. Listed at the BPDA as 990 American Legion Highway, its application is moving through the agency’s approval process, although it has met with community resistance regarding what would be its elimination of a significant chunk of the City’s available open space.

Emphasizing his lack of faith in the BPDA, O’Brien advocated for focusing community effort on Mayor Wu. “It’s really up to the Mayor,” he said. “The Mayor’s the shot caller. She ran on the platform of fix-

ing the broken development process. She ran on the platform of saying neighborhoods shouldn’t have to negotiate a deal off on our own.” He also advised those interested to directly contact City Councilor Ricardo Arroyo’s office.

The comment period for 990 American Legion Highway closes on June 20. To do so, go through the BPDA website’s active development projects page. For more information on the Crane Ledge Woods preservation effort, visit www.savecraneledgewoods.org.

In other Hyde Park news, the River Street Bridge at Cleary Square has been closed since May 20, when a routine inspection found that it had the potential to become unsafe. Inspections are ongoing to determine next steps and have taken longer than expected because of Amtrak and commuter trains regularly passing through and underneath.

Harvard Avenue is now open to traffic. It had been closed to run underground lines for the newly installed electric vehicle charging stations in the municipal parking lot.

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
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

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
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
