Boston Elks feed hundreds on frigid Thanksgiving morning

The annual Lodge 10 Elks Thanksgiving Dinner attracted hundreds of residents and volunteers despite the unseasonably cold weather, on Nov. 22 at the Elks Hall on Spring Street in West Roxbury.

Organizer Andy Schell said he was happy to see the community come together to serve those in need during the holiday season, whether they stayed home or came in, he said they served more than 300 meals to seniors across the city.

“We put out 333 meals on wheels, and they’re all out just like that,” Schell said, as many residents came up to him to congratulate him on the quality of the food and the company. “There’s always more coming in.”

The Elks collaborated with the Age Well Ethos team to deliver those 333 meals to seniors at home or in senior care throughout the city. Schell said they had about 33 driving teams to accomplish this goal, which he said was done well before noon. He said it was something of a record for them this year, both in terms of de-

livery time and volume.

Schell said he’s happy to help anyone he can.

“That’s why I’m here,” he said. “We’ve been here for years.”

Elks Exalted Ruler Rich Swann thanked those who came out and those who volunteered for the event.

“To all our Elk volunteers in the kitchen, our wait staff out here and all the people who put this together, I cannot thank you enough,” he said. “I would also of course like to thank our guests, all of

Hundreds feel the holiday spirit

More than 500 people came to the heart of Hyde Park to see the 38th annual lighting of the Anderson Tree. But what they were able to experience during the four-hour-plus extravaganza was a taste of sports history, a living Hyde Park legend, a variety of song and dance, and art and activities for all ages to bring out holiday cheer and HP pride.

The rain sprinkled, but the expected downpours held off. The event did have a few glitches, however. The annual carousel was unable to come due to the

anticipated inclement weather, but it was replaced with a video gaming station.

District City Councilor Tim McCarthy announced that Mayor Martin J. Walsh was unable to attend the tree lighting for the first time during his administration.

“The Mayor gave a call a couple of hours ago to say that he was going to have to miss this event,” McCarthy said, noting diplomatically that he had to deal with “city stuff.”

He also thanked the number of officials in attendance, including state Sen. Mike Rush, Rep.

City Council looks to spend Uber money

The Boston City Council Committee on Ways and Means met on Monday, Nov. 26 and discussed a new grant that gives the city \$6.5 million to address the impact of transportation network services on municipal roads.

The funds are being appropriated from the city’s Capital Grant Fund to look into the impact ride share services like Uber and Lyft are having on the city’s roads and bridges.

Boston City Budget Director Justin Sterritt said the \$6.5 million appropriation will be spread

out over two years, and he said the amount is an estimation of revenue from the state’s 10 cent Ride Assessment for rides originating in Boston.

“Chapter 187 of the Acts of 2016 of State Law regulates the Ride Share Industry and assessed a 20-cent per ride fee with 10 cents coming back to the originating municipality and 10 cents staying in the state,” he said. “Funding for this assessment was collected and deposited into the city as a special revenue.”

Chief of Streets Chris Osgood said the funding will be taken from

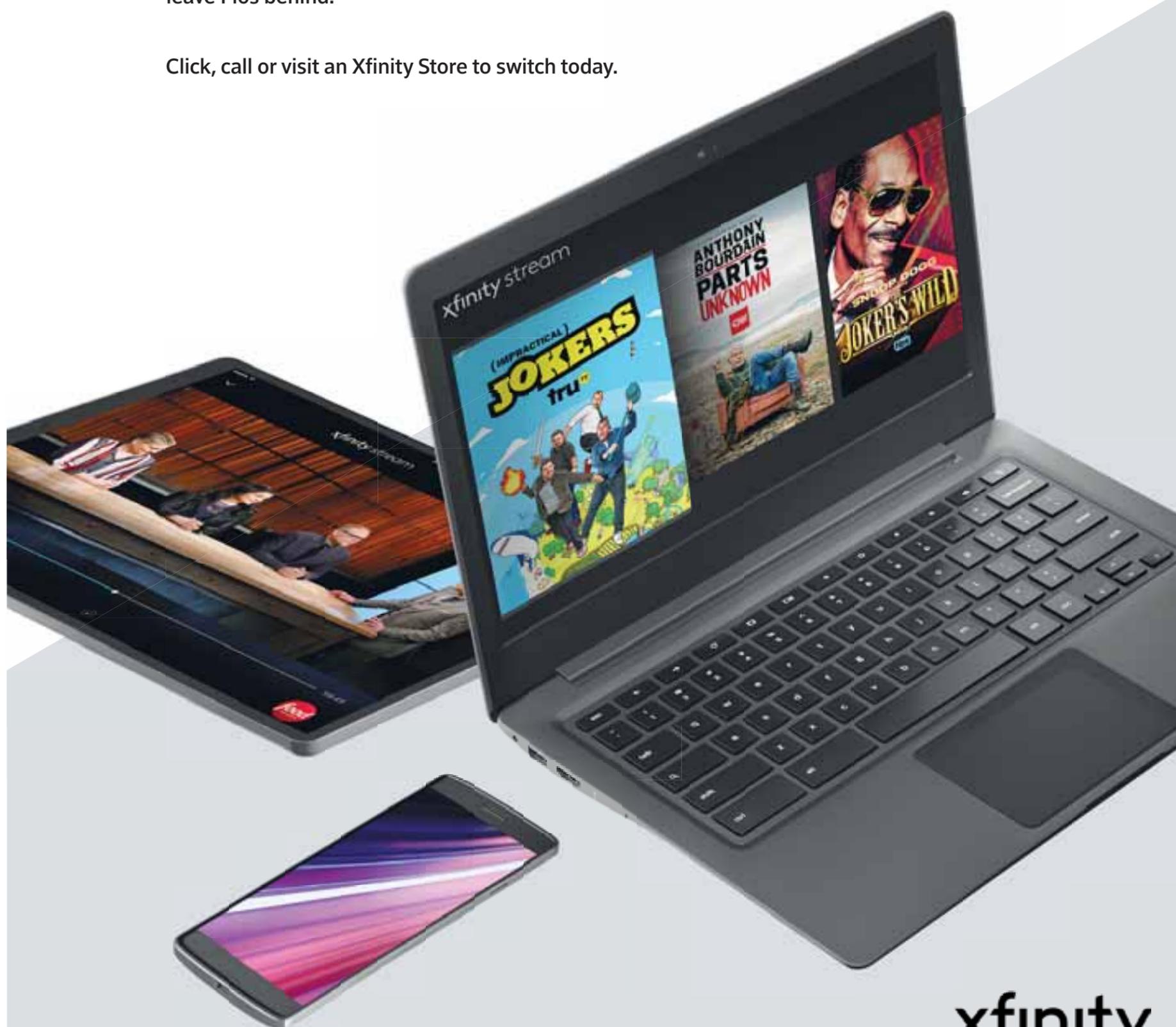

Fairmount looking at resident parking to stop swarm of commuters

The residents of Fairmount Hill gathered on Nov. 27 at the Boston Police Academy in Hyde Park to talk about introducing resident parking to sections of the neighborhood to keep down the number of commuters taking up space.

District 5 City Councilor Tim McCarthy organized the meeting and he said he thinks this would be a good solution for those living on the Hill.

“I hope this is going to be

the shortest meeting you’ve ever been to,” he said. “I used to be on the basic city services team as many of you may know, and we’ve done this type of thing in other neighborhoods and it’s worked very well.”

McCarthy said the fluid nature of the signs and resident parking-restricted areas – in that they can be removed easily if needed – makes it a good solution that would not necessarily impact residents too badly. The restriction he is recommending is one for resident-only parking from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

“If you go resident parking all day, when Nana comes to visit, Nana’s going to get a ticket,” he said. “With this time constraint we’ve eliminated the commuters all together... It’s worked incredibly well and I think we had only two minor changes up on the hill by [Most Precious Blood]. Other than that it’s been working great, that neighborhood association we met with in September is thrilled with it.”

Resident permit parking has to be established by residents, and so McCarthy said he

wanted to get folks together to discuss where the signs should go. One resident pointed out that establishing a resident parking area will just push the commuters further, but McCarthy pointed out there is a limit.

“I mean how far are you going to walk?” he said. “I think we should start small and see how far people want to walk, and I think you’ll find if the limits aren’t big enough, we’ll expand.”

The actual area of the proposed resident parking would start east of Truman Highway, but not on Truman Highway since that is a state-owned highway and the city does not have jurisdiction to create any other kind of parking restrictions there. Residents considered how far to go, with one resident saying they should consider going all the way to Milton, but the street’s residents seemed to think the area between Beacon Street and the streets encapsulated by Fairmount Avenue and Dana Avenue are the most in need. Also included in the discussion were Milton Avenue, Albion Street, Highland Street and Warren Avenue.

One resident pointed out that anyone in Readville who didn’t want to park at the Readville Commuter lot and pay the \$4 for parking and the \$6.75 for the T fare would go to Fairmount Hill, park for free and get a reduced fare. Fairmount is in Fare Zone 1A, which only charges \$2.25 for a one-way ticket, according to the MBTA website. Readville is in Zone 2, which costs \$6.75. Other residents pointed out that the MBTA has changed its parking fee from \$4 to \$2 recently, but some still felt that other Hyde Park residents may take advantage of the resident sticker and park in Fairmount so as not to pay the Readville price.

McCarthy said he did not believe that would be a significant factor, or that anyone would go through the trouble of getting a resident parking sticker for that purpose. He and Indigo Line Alliance member Bob Vance said the MBTA is conducting a study to figure out the feasibility of lowering all Boston fares to Zone 1A, but conceded that that study would not be done until 2019. McCarthy said he’s working diligently to speed up the process, however.

McCarthy said residents need to take the process into their own hands. He said each street needs at least 51 percent of households on that street to sign a petition for resident parking, and so street captains from each street need to go out and collect signatures. He said residents can contact City Hall for the required paperwork, but he also provided it at the meeting.

For the actual resident stickers, McCarthy said residents can apply for them online, at City Hall or at a City Hall To-Go Truck the city sends out periodically.

“You don’t have to leave the neighborhood,” he said. “You just need your license, registration and a utility bill. Make sure your registration matches your Hyde Park address.”

McCarthy reemphasized that point, as some residents register their vehicles at their secondary residences for tax purposes, and he said that just



won’t fly. The address on the registration for the vehicle applying for the sticker must be the same as the Hyde Park address submitted.

One resident who already has resident parking said it’s a real easy process and the city has a service set up so that when the sticker is about to expire near two years from the original issue, residents can renew online with minimum hassle and another will be mailed.

McCarthy said the process of implementation should be pretty quick, giving a window of 30 to 45 days after the petitions are processed to actual signs being erected. He said for the first two weeks, warnings will be issued to violators and then \$60 tickets would then be issued. He emphasized the importance of residents getting their stickers as soon as it is known their usual parking area is becoming a resident parking space, and to make sure that all other outstanding parking tickets are paid, as the city will not issue a resident sticker until that is done.

Bell ringers and holiday giving abound in the Parkway

This year, several Parkway organizations are asking the neighborhood to step up and give for the Holiday Season.

The West Roxbury Business and Professional Association (WRBPA) is teaming up with the Salvation Army once again for its bell ringing campaign. WRBPA President Jim Hennigan said the need is as great as it's ever been.

"It's a lot of phone calls to say the least," he said.

The campaign solicits funds every year, and Hennigan said they raise a good chunk of change for those in need.

"Last year, it was around \$25,000 and that's pretty consistent year to year," he said. "Over the past Saturday before Thanksgiving, with only four days of bell ringing we raised around \$3,000 in those four days."

The ringers camp out at the Roche Brothers in West Roxbury, as they have since 1992.

"It's our 17th year," Hennigan said. "Back in 1992, I saw a newscast that the Salvation Army was having a tough time getting volunteers and I just knew West Roxbury has a great community of people who volunteer for many, many things. I contacted the Salvation Army and told them we wanted to get them volunteers to ring the bells, every day from now right until Christmas Eve."

Hennigan said they will be taking volunteers right up until then again this year. He said originally they started the first week of December, but have stepped it up to before Thanksgiving. He said they get a lot of individuals coming out to help, but they also get a good deal of organizations coming to get in the holiday spirit as well.

"Tuesday we had the YMCA Board of Directors out there for the entire day," he said. "We've had the Friends of the West Roxbury Library on Thursday and the West Roxbury Roslindale Kiwanis too. Last week it was the West Roxbury Roslindale Rotary, and we have businesses from the commu-

nity like the Cooperative Bank, the Brookline Bank and East Boston Savings Bank. That obviously helps with the booking, but we always need more volunteers."

Hennigan said anyone wishing to volunteer can reach him at Jim@JimHennigan.com. He added the Kiwanis supports the Kettle Campaign, and it also does its own bell ringing.

"Kiwanis supports both the Kettle Campaign at Roche Bros. and they also have the Roslindale Food Pantry Fundraiser," he said.

According to the Kiwanis, they already raised \$275 at the Holiday Tree Lighting on Saturday for the Holiday Fundraiser in Memory of Judie Leon for the Roslindale Food Pantry. The event is set up by the Kiwanis and Hennigan said there is always cooperation between sharing volunteers for the two groups.

"There's plenty of openings if anyone wants to help out," said campaign organizer and Kiwanis President John Sullivan. "We've been doing it for 10 years and Judie was a big part of it. People love to help out, so come out and stand for an hour or two, it's great."

Sullivan said he always gets a good feeling talking to people while he's out canning for the Food Pantry, and sometimes people don't even know the pantry exists.

"It's the feeling of happiness

giving back, you wouldn't believe the people; they get me coffee and muffins, the sponsors are tremendous and last year we did more than \$5,000, it's tremendous," he said. "People walk by and say how do I get involved and I say I'm the guy, I'm the man and I carry the book with me at all times; it's a tremendous outpouring from the community every year."

Sullivan said they also have cans in many of the local businesses for residents to donate to the pantry.

"We have the cans in most of the stores in the square and the banks, they're everywhere and it works, and it really makes me feel like I'm making a small difference. I'm very happy and I love doing it," he said. "There are people who don't know anything about the food pantry and when people ask me questions, they want to know why I'm standing out there. I say this is for the food pantry. It's good to make people aware of what we do here in Roslindale."

Roslindale, fueled by coffee and hot chocolate provided free by volunteers. Children playfully ran around the park as performers enchanted the evening with holiday music and dance, and Santa Claus and Mrs. Claus came into town on a large firetruck to sit with children, take their requests and get their photos taken.

Resident Cora Karey said she comes almost every year to see the Clauses and her friends and family.

“We like to put up an ornament on the tree and see it for the whole rest of the holiday season,” she said. “It’s really nice to have something in walking distance.”

Resident Jody Burr said the event holds a special place in her heart, at least because she used to be directly involved in its preparation and execution.

“I actually used to run this event long ago, I used to be the Roslindale Village Main Streets Executive Director and my kids have been coming here since they were babies,” she said. “They’re 10 and 12 now, but we still come. Now they’re not sitting on Santa’s lap anymore, we just come because it’s tradition.”

Burr said the event has been a serious tradition for the neighborhood, and the only thing that’s really changed over the years is the participation from

the neighborhood.

“I feel like there’s a ton more people,” she said. “A lot hasn’t changed, which is one of the reasons I love it. I mean there’s more food and more people involved in kind of like community groups giving out flyers and things like that, but there’s still the brass band, Santa coming on the fire truck and all the politicians and stuff like that.”

Residents Andy Hollinger and Kris Liberman said they’ve been coming to Adams Square almost every year and enjoy it immensely.

“The Roslindale community is just amazing, and this is just one of our traditions,” said Liberman. “We’ve lived in Rozzie for 29 years and it’s just great.”

Hollinger runs the Roslindale Porchfest with Glenn Williams every year, and he said seeing a concert on Adams Park is always a treat.

“I play here sometimes too,” he said. “But I just love this, it really brings people together.”

Residents Jennifer and Michael Potter said they are always amazed at the musical acts every year, but through one accident or another, they somehow never seem to make it on time for the lighting itself.

“We’re always here at like 3:45 or 4, but our kids come to

hang out with their friends,” said Jennifer. “We have kids who are 16, 14 and 10, and so the older ones will just take off. They’ll go get something to eat, go to Fallon Field and just have fun.”

Resident Bill Hahn said there is an economic factor to the event as well.

“It helps the Roslindale Village sell stuff, which is just great for small businesses,” he said.

Resident Matt McNamara said it’s great the kids get to come out and connect with the greater community.

“We definitely have a fun time, the kids love seeing Santa,” he said. “It also makes people interact with the greater community of Roslindale versus the localized neighborhoods around here.”

Residents Pat Girvan and Z Tutein said they come out to support the Square every year.

“I’m part of Sacred Heart Church and we volunteer and do a lot of activities here and I was born and raised in Roslindale, so anything to help Roslindale,” she said. “It’s a good time too; there’s arts and crafts for the kids and the pet show was really funny too.”

2019 Toyota Corolla Hatchback SE

I cannot remember the last time I saw a Toyota Corolla hatchback. Then, this 2019 arrived at my doorstep for a week's test drive. The Corolla is a real functional, small in size, four-door hatchback that has a lot of storage room. It has grown larger in size, like most same model vehicles. This is a front drive car with a Dynamic CVT. From a dead stop, like at an intersection or stop light, step on the accelerator and there is plenty of power due to the transmission design. I am not a fan of the CVT transmission revolution, however they have gotten a lot better. Our test car had 16-inch alloy wheels, LED lighting with auto on/off, LED daytime running lights, acoustic noise-reducing windshield, color-keyed outside mirrors, single zone automatic climate control, a 4.2-inch multi-information display, sport seats, 60/40 fold down rear seats, leather-wrapped steering wheel, smart key system, and push-button keyless entry. There are a few option packages available. As for safety, Toyota has become a leader in standard safety and accident avoidance features in all their vehicles. They build cars that people both need and want and they always seem to attract previous and future buyers with their innovative ideas.

The base Corolla sedan starts out at \$18,700 (destination \$920). If you want a 6-speed manual transmission, the SE sedan starts at \$21,865. Our test hatchback SE starts at \$21,090. Fuel economy is anywhere from 28 city to 42 highway, depending on your driving habits and the time of year. Toyota vehicles do have some of the best resale values of any vehicle in the country and are usually passed down to family members when mom or dad wants a new one.

Angelo Scaccia, and City Councilor at Large Michelle Wu. McCarthy praised Scott Batey, president of the Hyde Park Board of Trade; Bill Parent, the head of Blue Hills Savings Bank; BPD Capt. Joseph Gillespie and his team; and members of the event's organizing committee for bringing the day's vision to reality.

This year's event was extra special because of two green visitors with a special surprise. The Boston Red Sox allowed Wally the Green Monster and his partner, Tessie, to visit Hyde Park with the coveted World Series trophy. Lines for pictures at the Hyde Park Municipal Building, where the main functions took place, were about as long for pictures earlier in the day with a visitor all the way from the North Pole in a red suit – Santa Claus himself – to the delight of the children.

Fr. Ron Coyne, head of the Blue Hills Collaborative and pastor of Most Precious Blood Parish, gave the blessing of the tree before it was lit.

"We need to learn from history," Coyne said. "Whether you celebrate Christmas or Chanukah or Kwanza, the world is really only one."

Lifelong Hyde Park resident John Leoncello, 94, had the honor of lighting the tree in Logan Square. As a private in Army General George Patton's third unit, Leoncello earned the purple heart. He was onstage with his wife of 71 years and his two sons.

"This is a little piece of his-

tory," said Julie Beckham, the community relations manager at Blue Hills Bank, who emceed the main show.

Riverside Theatre Works and Dance Academy provided the bulk of the entertainment. From ballet to sultry jazz dancing to traditional carols and more modern pieces, they wowed the crowd with heartfelt performances from toddlers to college dancers.

"We began performing here when the event first started 38 years ago," said RTW founder Marietta Phinney. "That's the same year the theatre was started, and I had my first student, P.J. Terranova, who just performed in 'A Chorus Line.'"

There were plenty of activities going on hours before the tree lighting. Singer Jems Melay, whose first album dropped this month, gave a stirring gospel rendition that moved the crowd. His other song had a Caribbean flavor.

"I was invited by Walter Marroquin of The Switch and Scott Batey," he said. "I was really excited to perform here and would gladly sing at other events. It was an honor."

Resident Sue Connolly and her daughter were visiting the petting zoo, which was stationed in the Blue Hills Bank parking lot up the street. They moved to Hyde Park from Dracut about a year ago and had visited the tree lighting last year.

"This petting zoo is so cute that I just can't get over it," she said, noting her love of pigs while her daughter, Adrianna, petted a

rabbit for the first time. "I think it is the coolest thing."

The children were entertained at Riverside Theatre Works by Jonathan Hoste, who supplied the Paw Patrol characters. He runs offices in Boston and Woburn and supplies music, balloon animals, costume characters, mascots, karaoke and deejaying for parties and special events.

"I have been doing the characters here for three years," he said. "Two years ago, we did Elsa and Olaf from 'Frozen.' The first year we did Mickey and Minnie Mouse."

Hoste also did the balloon shapes at the Muni later in the day. "I've been doing this for 25 years because I love kids."

"The tree lighting was a good event to come to for families," Ola Ogunbodede said. He came to get his picture taken with his children Jai and Jo. "And we had to come for this picture."

"This was a fabulous event," Murphy said at the end. "I have been to 38 of 38. Between Riverside Theatre Works and Dance Academy's performances, the Red Sox contributions, the Board of Trade, the Blue Hills Bank and Fr. Coyne's words of inspiration, the day really captured our spirit. Happy holidays and merry Christmas to everyone in the neighborhood."

"This is bigger than ever," Wu said, noting the engagement of the business community and participation of the volunteers. "It speaks to all of that vitality that makes Hyde Park a great neighborhood."

the assessments of 2017 and 2018.

"In 2017, across the Commonwealth there were roughly 64 million rides started in Massachusetts, and of those 64 million, 34.9 million, roughly, started within the City of Boston so, at 10 cents per ride that starts in a host city, the City of Boston received \$3.49 million from the state assessment," he said.

Osgood added that for 2018, they are looking at another \$3.49 million, which he said should provide the appropriated funds above. Osgood said they will be looking at capital projects and one-time purchases, as in 2026, the funding may stop.

"In 2026, this current revenue stream sunsets according to state law," he said. "So the big categories we're looking at for the \$6.5 million is roughly \$5 million in capital improvements, which includes roughly \$2 million invested for sidewalk repair... We have some significantly deteriorating sidewalks. There will be about \$1.6 million for bike infrastructure investment to improve biking infrastructure in the city."

Osgood said for biking, they would be looking at more BlueBike stations as well as building infrastructure for undeserved regions like the Southwest Corridor and Mass Ave.

"We are also looking at spending \$1 million in improving roadway markings, like crosswalks, land markings, etc. in our streets and making sure they remain in good repair," he said. "We also want to look at \$500,000 to build temporary plazas in areas like our Main Streets Districts to create even better places for people to come together and enjoy our retail hubs across the city."

Osgood said they are also using a small portion of the funding for a series of grant-funded positions, including a traffic signal engineer, civil engineers and two planning positions to look at key areas in the city.

District 5 City Councilor Tim McCarthy said he is somewhat worried about the 2026 sunset clause and feels the council and Boston Mayor Marty Walsh should get moving on advocating for the reinstatement of the program come 2026.

"I think the state swung and missed in a big, big way," he said. "You're looking at half the rides starting in Boston, and this is the reason why our offices are flooded every day with 'I can't get to Hyde Park,' 'I can't cross the bridge,' 'I can't get home in an hour.' ... If you stand out on Congress Street right now you'll see hundreds and hundreds of cars go by you with nobody in the back seat with Uber and Lyft signs just aimlessly driving around. So I think as we move forward with that, imagine if it was a buck a drive in Boston or a buck a drop off in Boston? Now you're looking at \$78 million a year for Boston."


