LANA discusses concerns about roadway safety, power lines

The Longfellow Area Neighborhood Association (LANA) discussed several key topics at its two-hour bi-monthly virtual meeting on Monday, Jan. 10, including the condition of the neighborhood's sidewalks and streets as well as the proliferation of power lines attached to double poles.

At the meeting's start, LANA Chair Kathy McCabe announced that the group now has two marquee sponsors as it is celebrating its "25-plus-one anniversary": Rogerson House and Henry's Market.

"I can't thank them enough for their support and sponsorship," she said, noting that Rogerson House operates the Longfellow House elder

housing development in the neighborhood.

McCabe also questioned Uju Onochie, the liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services (ONS), if she knew if either Mayor Michelle Wu or Chief of Streets Jascha Franklin-Hodge was going to respond to a letter LANA sent to them in late December regarding transportation and mobility issues in the neighborhood. Onochie said she had recently returned from vacation and would see if she "could help quicken the pace if necessary" once reviewing the email chain.

Board member Brendan Fogarty gave an update on the situation to the

City interested in saving Peace Garden, neighbors split

The Egleston Square Peace Garden has the attention of City Hall.

State Rep. Liz Malia's aide Michael Rogers gave the first bit of news of the New Year at the Jan. 3 virtual Egleston Square Neighborhood Association (ESNA) monthly meeting.

"We got a very encouraging message from City Hall," he said. "A wonderful email; the city is really interested in getting something for us."

Jacob Bor, who lives on Atherton

Street and is part of the Friends of the Peace Garden, elaborated. "We drafted a petition requesting that the property be transferred to the city. We didn't specify what the park could be used for. We addressed it to the mayor, park commissioner and Clear Channel. We got 300 signatures," he said.

Bor said they presented the petition to the mayor's office the Monday before Christmas.

Then on Dec. 28, "we got an email

ERNA reviews rent, homeownership and assaults

The East River Street Neighborhood Association (ERNA) in Hyde Park met in a virtual format on Jan. 10 and discussed issues of police, rent and homeownership during the meeting.

Boston Police Department District E-18 Community Service Officer Paul Broderick started off the meeting reviewing the crime report for the last month. He started with assaults, of which there were only two. He said the first took place on Dec. 13 at 1 a.m. at 62 Blake St. Broderick said the victim reported a car in front of his that blocked the road and a then a woman behind him got out of her car.

"Walked up to him, banged on his

window, told him to move his car out of the way and before he could explain it was another car blocking the way, she punched him in the face and went back to her car," he said.

Broderick said the next incident took place on Jan. 1 for a domestic assault and battery. Broderick said the party was arguing with their ex outside and the ex got agitated. Apparently, the ex started hitting the victim's vehicle with a piece of wood and when the victim went to stop them the ex hit the victim with said piece of wood on the back and then took off.

Broderick said there was a robbery at the Santander Bank at 4:30 p.m., during which a male gave the teller a note informing them of his possession of a handgun

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Winter Farmers Market returning to Brighton on 29th

The third annual Brighton Winter Farmers Market will start on Jan. 29 at the Presentation School Foundation (PSF) Community Center parking lot at 640 Washington St. from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

The market will run every other Saturday including Feb. 12, Feb. 26, March 12, March 26 and ending on April 9. Then the regular summer market will return.

The market is a collaborative effort of the PSF and the Allston Brighton Health Collaborative. Organizer Jess Rubin said they are taking basic COVID-19 precautions.

“If somebody’s sick, please don’t attend the Farmers Market and, obviously, we promote the wearing of masks but we’re going to make it optional at this point,” she said.

The winter market started back in 2020, and PSF Executive Director Clodagh Drummey said they first held it indoors for two instances before they decided to shut it down until the summer.

“We had it at the community center and the market was unfortunately cut short because of the pandemic,” she said. “But we brought it back last year in 2021 and we decided to move it outdoors to the parking lot to make it more COVID friendly and, based on the success of the market, we decided to continue it this year.”

Rubin agreed that the second instance of the market, the winter option has been a big hit. She said it’s very necessary in the neighborhood, as fresh produce isn’t available all the time to everyone.

“We live in a bit of a food desert; there’s not a grocery store to access produce except for Johnny D’s Fruit and Produce, which is a great option, but they are not a real grocery store

on the strip on Washington Street,” she said. “So we wanted to create access points for fresh food, one being the summer farmers market on the Common and, knowing that it’s kind of difficult to have it in the winter, I partnered individually with the Presentation School Foundation to have another access point in Oak Square where people can access farm fresh local products that are all New England-based. We wanted to provide that also with an emphasis on culture, food and local options.”

Drummey said the summer market started in 2015 for much the same reason, and she said the need that both markets help fill is particularly glaring during the pandemic.

“It’s been great, especially during these last few years when it was hard for people to gather. It is nice to see our community center serve as a site for people to safely gather and access healthy fresh food and we’re excited to continue the effort this year,” she said.

Rubin added there are other community programs to help fill in the gaps, like the Fresh Truck

program that takes place every Monday from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the PSF parking lot.

“There has been some overlapping in some of the programs, but there has certainly also been a need,” she said. “But along with that there has been an increased need for food access in general and also subsidized access. More people are on SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) or the EBT (Electronic Benefits Transfer) program and there’s more demand. We’ve partnered with the City of Boston to start a coupon program too, which is in high demand as well. There is certainly a need for food access and we want to provide those access


winterfarmersmarket/. Drummey said she wanted to specify that the winter market is sponsored by the PSF and the summer market is sponsored by the Health Collaborative.
 “We both hired Jess to run each market just to keep that continuity,” she said.

A great idea?—nah!

I thought I had a great idea to save you and me taxpayers’ money. But, having done some research on the matter, I have come to the sad conclusion that my thought about saving federal and state taxes is inane as well as insane.

Here in the dark days of winter, my mind wanders ahead to the good ol’ summertime, heading east to Castle Island, north to Cape Ann, or south to Cape Cod. I’ve driven over the Sagamore and Bourne Bridges countless times over the decades—as well as on the roads that parallel the Cape Cod Canal. Not more than a handful of times during more than half a century have I seen large ships in the Canal, whose tall masts have warranted the high structures of both vehicular bridges as well as the railroad trestle. Truth be told, when driving over either bridge, I’m hesitant to look down for more than a nano-second at the water because of the narrow, Jamaica-way-like vehicular lanes: I’m more concerned about a head-on crash or scraping the extra high curbs.

Because of the absence of seeing tall-masted ships traversing the waters from my car going over or alongside the Canal, I came to the conclusion that perhaps the replacement bridges, now being eyed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, do not have to be so high: the replacement bridges could be somewhat horizontal, but allow-

ing for a moderate sized sailboat to pass underneath, sort of like the newer bridge leading to the Seaport District, which serves as a replacement for the old Northern Avenue span. The proposed bridges do not have to be Tobin/Mystic River Bridge high.

How wrong I was! Research shows that about 7,000 commercial ships pass through the canal annually, including those carrying cars, oil, and fish. Okay, fishing boats such as those the size of the Andrea Gail and Hannah Boden (cf. Sebastian Junger’s movie “The Perfect Storm”) do not have THAT high a mast.

So down goes that idea of saving us taxpayers’ money. But, still, even on future Canal crossings I will be on the lookout for such large ships. Evidently my timing is way off.

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Councilor Baker files info request as Mass Cass relocation ramps up

District 3 Boston City Councilor Frank Baker filed two 17F requests for information at the Boston City Council organizational meeting on Jan. 3.

The first request was for information on jurisdiction and ability to enforce the vaccine mandate still scheduled to go into effect on Jan. 15, as of the date of publication. Baker's second request was for information he said he's been asking for over the last month regarding the relocation efforts of 83 individuals residing at tent encampments on Mass and Cass.

Baker said he filed the 17F requests because no hearings could be held, as no committees have yet been formed within the City Council. His main concern was the use of the Roundhouse Hotel – a vacant hotel near the intersection of Mass. Ave. and

Melnea Cass Boulevard – to temporarily house residents from the tent enclosures.

Baker said he wants information on what city organization is taking charge of maintaining the building and holding the lease; what's the commitment for using the building financially, and other concerns.

"Are there going to be drugs used on the premises? What is the security plan? When we asked in a meeting what the security plan detailed the person from BMC (Boston Medical Center) said it was 'very high level,' whatever that means. I can handle high level, I want to know what the security plans are. Again, these are all filed because we're unable to have hearings now. We don't have our committees and we will not be having hearings for a month."

The 17F request is a legal mechanism enshrined in the Boston City Charter that allows

councilors to request specific information from the mayor on any municipal matter within its jurisdiction. The mayor, or a relevant department head, is then required to attend a public meeting and answer questions related to the topic.

Wu held a press conference on Jan. 10 regarding the situation at Mass and Cass where she announced that the Roundhouse is now being used to house some of the individuals from the tent encampment. She said before moving each resident the Boston Public Health Commission surveyed the area in December.

"Identifying 145 people who were living there between Dec. 6 and Dec. 8, the dates of the survey," she said. "Almost all individuals who were surveyed then stated that they would like to move into low-threshold housing, but that many of the existing shelter options were not meeting their needs. We also spoke with individuals about their medical and health conditions, about their journey to recovery and we truly established that for the vast majority of people there, almost everybody living in those vast encampments, the ideal solution, the dream really, was to find low-threshold supportive housing wrapped around with medical services."

Wu said she felt this approach would help fix the problem of the tent encampments, as in the past encampments have been moved but then reappeared elsewhere. On Jan. 4, Wu toured the now-shuttered Long Island Addiction Recovery Facility,

to ensure that the residents are safe and receiving the services they need," she said. "As of today (Jan. 10) we have people in the Envision Hotel, at the Reimagined Shelter Space at the 112 (Southampton St.) and Woods Mullen shelters, the cottages at the Shattuck – some of which are going to open next week because of electricity delays – the Roundhouse has started taking guests and Pine Street out of Shattuck will today be welcoming individuals as well."

Baker said the lack of information regarding his questions was troubling.

"This is pressing," he said. "The Roundhouse is not a surprise, we've been asking for over a month. All these questions I've been on record sending them for over a month now, so it shouldn't be a surprise. So why are they not being answered. We're asking people on the street if they want hotel rooms; we're not asking the neighborhood what their opinions are. It reminds me, if you ever wanted a question answered about the BPDA under (former Boston Mayor Thomas) Menino, good luck getting an answer. At least I couldn't, you had nobody to call, nobody returned my calls. This feels eerily the same. So everyone here now, you should be asking questions, because it feels like-"

Baker cut himself off at this point.

"I'm going to save my comments," he said.

The Council unanimously approved both 17F requests from Baker.

which was shut down after the structural integrity of the bridge going to the island was found to be seriously compromised. The bridge has since been torn down.

Wu said during that tour that the city is paying \$1.3 million a year to keep the facility heated and operational so that it could one day be used again. Wu said she's open to offering a ferry service or building a new bridge to the facility to provide a more permanent and spacious (1,000 beds) facility for residents experiencing homelessness, in recovery or both to stabilize themselves.

Chief of Housing and Director of Neighborhood Development Sheila Dillon said that to date, living spaces for 200 individuals have been identified and 159 of those spaces are now filled and in operation.

"Those spaces will be providing decent, warm and safe housing, and also every program brought on has 24-hour staffing

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

from Chief of Environment, Energy and Open Space Mariama White-Hammond saying she would contact Clear Channel to get a conversation going.

“We will have a meeting at her office with Clear Channel,” Bor said. “Who else should attend?”

The Friends Group is made up of Kevin Brill, headmaster of Greater Egleston High School, Rosana Javier Mangone, owner of the popular Latino Beauty opposite on School Street and Bor. The Friends are no summer soldiers; on a rainy Saturday, Dec. 18, after the tree lighting at Lawson Park, they marched and drummed and chanted down Washington Street to the Peace Garden.

“No venda el parque! Don’t sell the park!”

Mayor Wu and other elected officials including At-Large City Councilors Erin Murphy and Julia Mejia and State Representatives Liz Miranda and Liz Malia joined the tree lighting ceremony, but only Malia marched to the Peace Garden.

Malia is in her last year as

state representative and she spoke about the park’s history.

“I followed John McDonough, who was someone who years ago said that the park is a living and breathing monument to a serious time in Egleston Square,” she said. “If you’re serious about environmental justice, then this is one of the immigrant communities and communities of color that needs this resource.”

“I call on Clear Channel to come to an agreement with the city.”

The city seemed to agree. In a statement to The Bulletin, White-Hammond acknowledged the history Malia talked about.

“The Egleston Square community has taken responsibility for the Peace Garden and transformed it into a space for collective healing and joy. The city applauds this important work and is looking forward into ways we can support the neighborhood’s efforts,” she wrote.

Carolyn Royce, one of the leaders of ESNA, asked about next steps, but a consensus about

what the Peace Garden would become next was not apparent.

“How do we send the petition?” she asked. “The Friends need a strategy of what the Peace Garden will be. We need a reliable, well-run conversation to give Chief Hammond something to get the process going.”

Royce said the Friends Group has had ideas presented to them about what the Peace Garden could be.

City Life came to the meeting and said there was potential to buy the parcel and use it for affordable housing, she said.

“How many units? Would that preclude open space?” Royce asked. She also said that Denise Delgado of Egleston Square Main Street had “someone approach her that they had money to buy the park for the community.”

City Life did not respond to confirm and clarify their proposal.

Delgado replied the next day. “Nothing is confirmed. When all of this is resolved and is public information, we will shout it from the rooftops,” she said.

Sue Pranger of Chilcott

Place said there were two options.

“The really big elephant in the room is affordable housing,” she said. “There are two options, open space and affordable housing, but how far do we push for open space until we determine that open space won’t work?”

Pranger said she preferred open space scattered around the neighborhood, not all in one big space, but cautioned, “Let’s first get the land into city ownership. Secure the land first, create consensus next.”

Rogers agreed.

“We’re not across the finish line yet,” He said. “Get that message out there: we need to make sure we actually secure the land before we come up with a wish list.”

Bor said he was concerned. “I worry about competing community groups,” he said. “I worry about two timetables. The Clear Channel timeline is faster than the wonderful messy process of a community vision.”

Bor pointed out that “the petition did not specifically say a park, it just said save

the garden, but many signatures want a park. We deliberately left the use open in the petition. I’m not sure there is a consensus around if it should be a park.”

Rogers said that other city agencies might be interested such as the Department of Neighborhood Development (now the Mayor’s Office of Housing) or even the Boston Transportation Department (BTD).

Marie Turley of Union Avenue said she was concerned that there would be a track whereby Clear Channel would combine with City Realty which owns the adjacent garage.

“There’s three tracks,” Turley said. “The Parks Dept., Clear Channel and City Realty and a private buyer.”

Bor said that the Friends Group would meet on Monday, Jan. 10 to strategize a message in advance of the planned meeting with Chief Hammond.

Royce summed up that next step.

“We have to prepare for a meeting with the city,” she said.

25 meeting participants. He explained that late last year, several board members got together to create a “unified transportation vision” for the area.

Of paramount concern is the condition of Walter Street, where he said vehicles tend to speed. Reducing the posted speed rate and implementing improved traffic-calming measures such as raised beds and raised intersections were suggested tools.

“We think these are high-priority areas to really affect safety, both by mode of transportation and pedestrian access,” Fogarty said.

The intersections at South and Walworth streets as well as Robert and South streets are “pretty scary if you’re a pedestrian,” he added, noting that they are areas of concern and provide access to parks.

Pedestrian safety is an overarching goal. Repaving sidewalks on the side streets as well as Walter Street would improve accessibility and repair damage done by utility work.

“We think there is a huge need for re-conceiving pedestrian access and also just basic road pavement,” Fogarty said. Sidewalks and streets should facilitate access to the wetlands as well as the Arboretum.

Board member David Wean said he reached out to Danny Schissler, the Arboretum’s Head of Operations and Project Management, who had expressed concern about the condi-

tion of the sidewalks on Bussey Street. Wean asked that Bussey Street repairs be included in LANA’s request, as the Arboretum’s partnership could help “get a little more traction” for improvement efforts.

McCabe noted that almost all of the previous traffic-calming measures installed during the past three years, including pylons on Walter Street, have been knocked down. She also mentioned the “severe ponding” that occurred during last month’s dedication ceremony of 104-108 Walter St., which transpired during a torrential rainstorm. She said a request for design money would be helpful because the street is “really challenging.”

Jordan Frias, the chief of staff for District 5 City Councilor Ricardo Arroyo, said he would look into the matter with the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) and requested copies of any 311 reports that residents filed.

In a related topic, the board addressed concerns about the amount of telephone poles and wires in the area. Many of the poles that are replacing their predecessors coexist now because the wires need to be transferred over by multiple entities in a situation called “double poles.” Installation of the new poles has created damage to the sidewalks.

Joel Neiditz, a LANA member, presented a series of pictures on the “tangled web of wires” and the double poles. One of the old poles on

blocks was wired to a new one. At the base of some of the poles is “a bit of a pit” that needs to be filled to prevent pedestrians from tripping.

Nicole Bowden, the community relations specialist for Eversource, explained that Eversource is the owner of the poles. She said the new, larger poles were placed to meet the growing demand of electricity and strengthen reliability. This also allows for line switching remotely during power outages.

While Eversource completed its transfer process, companies including Verizon and RCN have not, she added. The National Joint Utilities Notification System (NJUNS) is a national software system for member entities that notifies utilities when double poles need to be replaced and when the work has been completed.

Bowden said that once all the other utilities remove their wires, the old poles will be removed and the sidewalks will be returned to “preconstruction condition or better.”

She added that it has been “a very difficult process” to contact other utilities to remove their lines from the

old poles. Bowden also said that Eversource does not derive any income from the additional wires on their poles; however, a fee is paid to “a centralized system such as NJUNS.”

LANA member David Dangler said Bowden was “wonderfully optimistic” about the speed with which other companies would remove the old poles and transfer the wires. Bowden replied that pole removal typically doesn’t take more than a year. However, the pandemic has caused staff shortages.

“I think a lot of these other utilities are just overwhelmed in trying to go out and do these things timely,” she added. She recommended that residents submit 311 requests to emphasize the need.

“When they hear from the City, they know it’s escalated,” Bowden continued.

In other news, LANA members discussed the successful celebration on Dec. 11 of the city’s acquisition of 104-108 Walter St., which will preserve the wetlands there. Habitat for Humanity will create the four affordable family housing units.

and demand of \$9,500 cash. The teller added a tracking device to his shopping list.

“His motor vehicle was later stopped up at Morton Street where he and two other males were arrested for the robbery,” he said.

Broderick said on Christmas Day on Westminster Street a resident reported the theft of their motor vehicle. He said the resident stated he left the vehicle running outside and went back to his house.

“When he came back out he noticed the vehicle was further down the street and crashed into a fence,” he said. “Videos showed a black male got into the vehicle and attempted to drive away, but he had trouble putting the car into gear and he got out of the car and took off. The vehicle rolled on its own, striking the fence.”

Broderick said there were larcenies on Dec. 18, Dec. 21, and Dec. 22 all on River Street. Two of the thefts were handicapped placards left on the vehicles.

“If you’re not parked in a handicapped spot, you should probably put it in the glove compartment because they are a hot item,” he said.

Broderick said on 204 Neponset Valley Pkwy. on Dec.

16 the Drug Control Unit conducted a search warrant after a “lengthy investigation” where they reportedly seized crack, 5 milligrams of fentanyl and a 9 millimeter handgun.

“They also seized \$204,000 in cash at the apartment,” he said.

Broderick said there were no reported incidents of breaking and enterings.

He mentioned that for 2021 versus 2020, District E-18 was down 18 percent for overall crime reports and the city overall was down 15 percent.

Also during the meeting, State Rep. Rob Consalvo reported on legislation he and the Massachusetts State Legislature are working on, notably one he filed to help ease rent burdens for residents.

“We have a law that allows tenants to claim a certain portion of their rent as a deduction on their income tax,” he said. “That law was last changed in 2001, yet the average median price of rents in the City of Boston has doubled in that time. So the law that was put in place in 2001 to help residents with their rent just isn’t applicable anymore.”

Currently, Consalvo said the limit on the deduction is \$3,000

and he filed a bill to double that to \$6,000.

“But, quite frankly, I believe that discussion is a floor, not a ceiling, because I’m not sure doubling it is even enough given the exorbitant costs of rent these days,” he said.

Consalvo added that the bill would also add a new tax credit for tenants as well based on interactions he’s had with housing advocates.

One resident on the call asked Consalvo about any upcoming legislation that would focus on homeownership. Consalvo, the former director of the Boston Home Center, dusted off his old spokesperson hat for the center and began discussing the myriad of programs the Boston Home Center can provide. He said any resident with any issue regarding purchasing, repairing or holding onto their home should contact the Boston Home Center before anything else.

Consalvo pointed to the many first-time home buyer programs the center offers, as well as foreclosure consultation programs and home repair programs, like the Senior Saves or Minor Repair program.
