Arroyo takes D5, women now the majority in Council

Ricardo Arroyo has been declared the winner of the 2019 Boston Municipal Election for District 5 of the Boston City Council.

The win marks the first time that a white male has not held that position in Boston ever, and Arroyo did not mince words at his campaign headquarters.

"We made history," he said to raucous cheers from the crowd. "Thank you."

Arroyo's competitor Maria Esdale Farrell would have made history as well, but came up about 1,000 votes short at 4,398 (45.05 percent) to Arroyo's 5,325 (54.54 percent) and, including the 40 write in votes counted (.41 percent) that totaled about 10,000 votes in a district where the United States Census Bureau puts the total population at about 100,000.

Arroyo started as a public defender in Boston, and said that

growing up in a household with a teacher as a mother and an elected official for a father he was always dedicated to finding ways to serve. In high school he was a youth coach and said it was there he first saw how some kids were being treated differently than others in terms of receiving services.

While Arroyo is joining the first Boston City Council with a majority of female members, he pointed out there was another piece of history made as well.

"I want to put this in big, bold, blinking neon lights," Arroyo said. "The city of Boston is going to have a majority person of color city council. And for the first time, the city is going to have a majority women council. Think about the folks who are going to have voices now. Think about the issues that are going to be lifted up."

In District 9 of Allston, Liz Breadon soundly beat Craig

WWII vet found, to be buried in WR

Needham-born and Jamaica Plain-educated World War II First Lieutenant Joseph Edward Finneran's remains have finally been located and identified after 76 years.

The U.S. Air Force bombardier will have visiting hours at the George F. Doherty and Sons Funeral Home at 1305 Highland Ave. in Needham and a Funeral Mass of Christian burial at St. Joseph's Church, 1382 Highland Ave. in Needham at 10 a.m. the following day.

Finneran's funeral procession will commence through Needham at Great Plain Avenue, Needham Street, a left on Bridge Street in Dedham to Spring Street in West Roxbury past the U.S. Veterans Administration Hospital. It will then go straight on to Centre Street to the Mount Benedict Cemetery. Residents and businesses along the route are encouraged to display flags during the procession to show their support.

According to Air Force records, Finneran was recovered and accounted for on Aug.

9 by the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency. He was first reported missing in the summer of 1943, when the 22-year-old was assigned to a B-24D Liberator in the 345th Bombardment Squadron, 98th Bombardiers Group, known colloquially as the "Pyramidiers."

His aircraft crashed on Aug.

1 of 1943 after being hit by anti-aircraft fire during Operation Tidal Wave, the largest bombing mission against the oil fields and refineries at Ploiesti in Romania.

Vermont State Police requesting aid in Roslindale man's murder

Employed in Hyde Park

Vermont State Police (VSP) announced on Monday evening that the Vermont Chief Medical Examiner's Office completed an autopsy on Roslindale resident Roberto Fonseca-Rivera, 44.

The VSP reported that Fonseca-Rivera had been shot in the head and neck, and they are reporting as of Monday that the case is now considered a homicide.

The VSP reported that Fonseca-Rivera, employed by Katsiroubas Produce of Hyde Park, was making deliveries for his employer. The VSP reported that Fonseca-Rivera was last heard from at about 12:15 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 1 leaving Rutland, Vt., and heading southbound on Ver-

mont Route 103.

The VSP stated its investigators believe the shooting occurred between 1 p.m. and

Police, Esdale Farrell address ERNA concerns

The East River Neighborhood Association (ERNA) had a packed agenda at its monthly meeting, held on Mon., Oct. 21 at 912 River St., ranging from traffic to accessing funding through the Community Preservation Act.

Area E-18 Police Officer Paul Broderick reported two incidents which occurred the day before, Mon, Oct. 20.

There was a shooting that evening on Reddy Ave. at the area of Ross Field at around 10:30 p.m.

“A call came in for a person suffering from gunshot wounds down at River and Tesla,” he said. “We believe that was the victim of the incident at Reddy Ave.”

Also, there was a home invasion on 27 Business Terr. at around 9 p.m. On Oct. 20, four males entered the rear door of the

apartment, which was left open,” Broderick said. “A couple of residents were tied up. Police were on the way at this time. They heard the sirens. They ran out the rear door.”

He added that two were arrested: one hiding underneath the stairs and one at the commuter rail station. Three guns were seized from a cupboard.

In addition to the recent police incidents, Broderick gave the police report since the last meeting. It included an incident on Sept. 11 at 57 Blake St at around 9 p.m., where someone in a white BMV fired shots at the porch. The pellets, which struck the porch, turned out to be from a BB gun.

Longtime resident Joy Oliver said she had noticed a white BMV driving around the Ayles and Westminster St. neighborhood two weeks ago between 8 or 9 p.m. and wanted to bring it to the police’s attention at the meeting. The police said they would research the matter.

Also of concern to residents was the increased traffic at that intersection, as well as speeding.

Capt. Joseph Gillespie said he would put it on the list for officers to address.

One resident wondered if Waze was sending all of the traffic down Westminster to avoid the traffic on the main streets.

In response to packages being stolen, ERNA co-chair Barbara Hamilton told the 25 attendees that they can have their UPS and Fed Ex packages delivered to a store at Hyde Park Ave. and West St.

“I don’t have my packages delivered at home because I live on a main thoroughfare,” she said.

Oliver also brought up that the ERNA had asked the City

months ago at meetings if lights could be put up at the parking lot at Ross Field, where the shooting took place. In the past, there had been a locked gate.

Also on the agenda was a presentation from Thadine Brown, Director of Community Relations for the City of Boston’s Community Preservation program. She explained that, although the deadline has passed for the 2020 spring award round, the ERNA should begin planning for projects they would like to see funded.

“Anyone can apply to our staff, and then the applications are submitted to our nine-member committee,” Brown said. The committee is comprised of five members appointed by Mayor Martin J. Walsh and four Boston residents who were selected by the City Council.

During the last round, Brown said the department funded \$34 million in projects, with \$18 million going to affordable housing, \$8 going to historic preservation, and \$8 going to parks and open spaces. They received 135 eligibility forms, narrowed down the process to 85 applications, and funded 56 applications.

Determination is based on community impact and priority, with each neighborhood getting two or three projects. For Hyde Park, it meant the historic SDA Church on River Street getting a new roof; the YMCA getting open space in the back, and the Hyde Park Library’s open space behind the building.

Hamilton said the ERNA had put in an application last time for the Doyle Playground, which is in need of landscaping and new equipment.

If a playground or park project gets funded, Brown said that the group would have to organize how it would be maintained. They would most likely have to form a group of volunteers to regularly pick up trash and debris.

Brown added that, when the process opens up for new members to apply to the Community Preservation application committee, she will let the ERNA know in case anyone has an interest in being involved in the citywide selection process.

MAC partners with Ohrenberger to transform elders into artists

Hyde Park's Menino Arts Center (MAC) is known for its juried art exhibitions, poetry readings and art classes, including its Mobile Arts Program at the Blake Estates. But on Tues., Nov. 5 instructor Rosemarie Clinton took her program on the road to West Roxbury, where 20 eager students awaited her for their first exposure to watercolor painting at the Ohrenberger Community Center.

The community room was packed with 20 excited elders, sorting through pictures of nature to inspire their creative instincts.

"There are no wrongs in this class," Clinton said, noting this is the largest class she has ever taught. "You do not have to do an exact replica. What I want you to do is your impression of the picture and what you see in it."

At first the group chattered nervously while Ohrenberger Senior Coordinator Lorna Bognanno spoke about her long-standing career working with seniors and the increasing need for programming for elders.

"I feel like my career has come full circle," she said. "I

have spent the past 36 years working with the elders in the community. Now I am a senior citizen myself."

Before she began at the community center, Bognanno worked at the YMCA from 1984 to 1999, serving as its fit-

ness coordinator for a decade and working with an elder program called Senior Adventure.

"This year I was able to budget for four arts classes with Rosemarie," Bognanno said. "I had heard about all of the work she has done in Hyde

Park and wanted to bring her here."

She added that the bi-monthly, 90-minute watercolor classes will be interspersed with arts and crafts workshops in the alternating months.

"This program has been

steadily growing since I came on in 2017," she said. "I was an operations manager with the City of Boston. Two days after I retired, I got called back

But through the relentless efforts of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, and the scientific wonder of DNA, he has been identified and has returned to his family, and will be, finally, laid to rest beside his mother. For his heroism and valor during WWII, Joe was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart, the Distinguished Flying Cross with one oak leaf cluster and the Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters.

The public is most cordially invited to participate in any part of this tribute for 1st Lieut. Joseph E. Finneran, a true American hero.

New Brook Farm


Last Saturday on a perfect October afternoon—it was actually November—underneath a brilliant, cloudless sky, the New Brook Farm launched its fifth focus on photography at the 180-acre historic farm as well as painting and other arts.

Warmly welcoming visitors with cider, pumpkin bread, humus, pita bread, grapes, and sweets, the coalition hosted a tour of West Roxbury's most famous historic site. While other Boston neighborhoods, such as South Boston and Charlestown can boast of Dorchester Heights and Bunker Hill respectively, West Roxbury's only claim to national fame lies in the remnants of a pre-Civil War attempt at utopian communal living by transcendentalists.

For a guy who lives only a few miles from the site, I was totally unaware of its status as a site under the auspices of a trifecta of the Boston Landmarks Commission, United States National Historic Site, and the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation.

The highlight of the afternoon was a special guided walk with Thoreau re-enactor Richard Smith, replete with appropriate costume and public discourse (no contractions whatsoever). Originally from Akron, Ohio, this historian captured the essence of Concord's most famous citizen.

The traipse through the

woodlands brought mention of other famous names such as Ralph Waldo Emerson, Margaret Fuller, and the Alcotts, with whom Thoreau interfaced. Many of us learned that we had been pronouncing Henry David's last name incorrectly: it should be THOR-oh, with the accent on the first syllable, although two web sites on pronunciation want it articulated Thor-OH, accent on the last syllable. Whatever.

January 31, 2020, is the last date for submitting collages, poetry, songs, needlework, photography, paintings, drawings, stories, centerpieces, and fairy house decorations to the Focus on Brook Farm competition. May local art and English teachers encourage submissions by children and teenagers so that the next generation is not as ignorant of the historical significance of Brook Farm as yours truly.



The U.S. Census Bureau announced earlier this month that it's that time of the decade again, as its agents prepare for the coming 2020 Census.

According to Senior Partnership Specialist at U.S. Census Bureau Raymond Bennett, the Bureau is still looking for census takers to pick up clipboards and get out in their communities.

"The Census is accepting permanent or temporary field positions in every U.S. County from now until Feb. 5," he said, adding residents can apply at 2020census.gov/jobs. "We've got a range of positions, like Census Taker, Recruiting Assistant, Office Supervisor or Field Supervisor. We've got opportunities across the state for day-

time, evenings and weekends and the pay is up to \$25 per hour with a maximum of 25 hours per week."

Bennett added the whole idea right now is to get as many Census takers as they need from their respective communities.

"The Census is committed to hire people within their community; hire people to work where they live," he said.

Bennett said he agreed that cold calling people at their homes, like a traveling salesman or a missionary, might not be the most attractive selling point of the job, but said they've had a long time to learn the ropes of cold calling as an organization, since the Census has been taken every 10 years since 1790.

We have paid training as well, which is designed to help Census Takers be prepared for all types of interactions they're going to have," he said.

The Census reported earlier this month that its agents have completed the results of a preliminary test run of the Census started back in the summer showed that the citizenship question had little effect on those taking the census, noticing only a dip of about 1 percent. Bennett said he feels even

1 percent is too much, and emphasized that all information given to the census is confidential and extremely well-guarded.

"The law requires the Census to keep all information confidential, Title 13 of the U.S. Code," he said. "It's a strong protection for the information we collect... It requires that the information we collect is only used to produce statistics. By law, that information is confidential and not allowed to be shared information with any federal agency, state agency or court."

Bennett added that every Census taker or Census employee must take an oath to protect that confidentiality, the breaking of which could result in five years in prison, a fine of \$250,000, or both.

Despite the need for Census takers, Bennett said the office is hoping that many residents choose to voluntarily take the census, either by mail, phone, or online so they won't have to take it in person.

"We're projecting that about 80 percent of residents will respond through the first three methods," he said. "We're hoping we reach everyone in the United States. We're working with multicultural organizations and group that have been historically hard to count and a lot of research has gone into ways to help increase self response from residents."

And Bennett said there are a lot of reasons to take the Census and make sure the government has a good count of where its residents live. For one, it determines where \$675 billion is allocated for communities across the country.

Bennett said the Census is expecting the U.S. total population to increase to 330 million people and 140 million households

The final day to tally up results is Census Day, which is slated for April 1 2020 next year. For more information and to take the Census online, go to <https://2020census.gov/>.

Pierce St. focused on environmental justice, lowering crime

The turnout was extremely low at the monthly Pierce St. Neighborhood Watch meeting on Tues., Nov. 5, with only three members attending due to the combination of Election Day and the driving rain.

However, the discussion turned from the decrease in the crime rate to how the neighbors could potentially bond together to improve the community through the use of clean energy.

"We were really pleased with the police report this month," chair Melanie Daye said. "There was one gunshot incident at Wood Ave. The person was shot twice and found at the corner of Wood Ave. and River St. last night at 11 p.m."

She added that there were no robberies reported in the area, as well as no larcenies, vandalisms, burglaries or drug incidents.

On Nov. 2 a motorcycle was stolen from 39 Pierce St. There were three auto thefts within the past month.

In other community news, James O. Michel said that the Hyde Park Youth Basketball Association has extended its registration drive through Sat., Nov. 9. It will be held at the Hyde Park Community Center from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. for children ages six to 14.

"Because we have such great support from our local businesses, the registration will only cost \$50 to \$60 for the entire season, which runs from December through March," Michel said. "This league is an incredible little jewel here in Hyde Park."

He added that some of the athletes who usually join are still participating in football and are beginning their youth tournament rounds.

On a more expansive note,

Michel urged the community to attend the next meeting of the group, which will be held at the Family Life Fellowship Church community room at 28 Arlington St. He will be giving a presentation on his work with the Boston Clean Energy Coalition, which he previewed.

He compared the use of energy to an episode of "The Simpsons." Nuclear plant worker Homer Simpson, who he described as "a dolt" and "very crude and primi-

tive," could not understand that products such as bacon, ham and pork chops could all come from pigs.

"We're at a point in time where, in the building trades, there's one magical building that improves your health, gives you superior air quality, improves your wallet because it costs less to heat and cool, and it helps to preserve the planet for future generations."

This "magical building" is often referred to as a "zero carbon"

or "net zero carbon building," Michel said. Now 70 percent of Boston greenhouse gas emissions come from buildings, according to a summary report entitled, "Carbon Free Boston."

"I prefer the term passive house," he said, noting that carbon dioxide has increased ever since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution in 1850s and has now become "like a blanket."

"The only time people started to become aware was in the 1970s, when they started to complain about smog," he said.

Daye asked if wood pellets would be more efficient than coal or gas. While they are better, the more environmentally sound energy sources would be solar panels and wind, according to Michel.

Advertisers have played a role in promoting the use of gas, oil and coal over the past several decades, Michel asserted.

"They have used some of the same tactics that big tobacco used," Michel said. "They said, 'Oh, it's really not that bad,' but all along, they knew differently."

"It's the same thing that's going on with vaping right now," Ramona Desire, a Family Life Fellowship member said. "They only see the income. They don't see the



City Council to approve funds for Mt. Hope, veterans

The Boston City Council held a hearing on Oct. 31 to discuss the appropriation of \$232,000 from the Cemetery Trust Fund to the Boston Parks and Recreation Department for maintenance and care of the city's three municipal cemeteries.

Mount Hope is one of three city-run cemeteries and includes the Evergreen Cemetery in Brighton and the Fairview Cemetery in Hyde Park that make up 200 acres of cemetery land according to General Administrator of Cemeteries at the Parks and Rec Tom Sullivan.

"He's a great guy and he's got a lot of people under him," said District 6 City Councilor and Chair of the Committee on Environment and Sustainability Matt O'Malley said with a laugh. "That's John Tobin's favorite joke."

The grant will provide \$140,000 for expansion and infrastructure improvements and then \$92,000 for repairs to the administration building for heating and air conditioning improvements. Temporary First Assistant Collector-Treasurer Richard DePino said the infrastructure improvements are there to provide increased burial capacity for veteran residents.

"As well as for our poor population," he said. "In addition, the second piece of the appropriation is specifically for the administrative building. To the building's credit, it has seen and used its useful life and this appropriation will have a complete replacement of that system."

O'Malley said he is proud that the city helps to provide burial services for residents in need and veterans, and

that the city helps pay for those services.

"You're losing a loved one and then just the cost of everything is terrible," he said.

Sullivan said the city offers free or discounted burial services for those in need, and services for veterans who were residents of the City of Boston at the time of their enlistment or current resident, and the charge for such a service is \$880 per veteran and their spouse.

"It varies, but we're very low end for a new grave for a private burial at Fairview is about \$4,000," Sullivan said. "If you go to St. Joseph's, which would probably be the next level up, it's about \$12,000. Eight-hundred-and-eighty dollars for a middle of the road cemetery, if you will, and then you have places like Forest Hills that go way up. So it's a substantial benefit for those who certainly deserve it."

Sullivan said they work with Boston's Veteran Services Department to approve those burials and then they physically lay them to rest.

"On the veterans' burials, we average about 40 a year," Sullivan said. "Those have been at Mount Hope at the FR Kelly Lot. On the city poor, we average about 80 indigent burials a year. Combined with the three active cemeteries, Evergreen in Brighton and Fairview in Hyde Park and Mount Hope, we average anywhere from 650 to 800 burials a year combined."

Sullivan said for indigent burials, the person is deemed indigent by the Massachusetts Department of Transitional Assistance, and a certificate to bury the individual is given to a local funeral home like the Lawler Home in West Roxbury or the Casper Funeral Services in South Boston.

"They're often the two that come forward and help with

that," he said. "I'm not positive about this, but their fee is usually around \$2,000, and our charge to the undertaker is \$276. So that's what we charge for the burial of a poor person."

Sullivan said that in the past, before a state law, many towns and cities in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts would send their indigent dead to Boston to take advantage of this price scale. He said that doesn't happen as often anymore.

"We just ask that the person be a Boston resident, if they die on the Boston Common, that's an address for us that's fine," he said. "I feel good that now we get 90 percent Boston residents."



Forces based in Libya and Southern Italy on nine oil refineries around Ploiesti. The idea of the attack was centered around the Oil Campaign, designed to deny petroleum to the Axis. It was a costly raid. Of the 177 B-24s involved in the attack 53 were destroyed and 55 were damaged. The 52 German fighters, supported by one German-Romanian Flak Division and one Romanian Anti-Aircraft Brigade, lost seven fighters total (two Romanian and five German.)

Of the 310 Americans killed during the raid only 27 could be identified, and Finneran wasn't one of them.

Those who could not be identified were buried as unknowns in the Hero Section of the Civilian and Military Cemetery of Bolovan in Ploiesti, and then reinterred in the American Military Cemetery at Neufville-en-Condroz in Belgium.

All those remains were exhumed in 2017 and later identified through anthropological and DNA analysis, according to the POW/MIA Accounting Agency. Finneran has been posthumously awarded the Purple Heart, the Distinguished Flying Cross with one oak leaf cluster and the Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters.

to work here.”

Although her hours have been cut, Bognanno said she learned the value of volunteerism from her mother, who served with the Resident Senior Volunteer Program until she was 90.

“This population is growing, and they are going to need our help,” Bognanno said of the baby boomers, who are now seniors. “And the younger people need to learn from their wisdom and their history. Even now, a lot of them rely on family members for childcare.”

The more relaxed the participants became, the more the inner Picassos leapt onto the paper.

Remo Guzstucci, who will be celebrating his 92nd birthday on Nov. 29, said he always loved art, “but I never got around to it.

“I only came here today because my wife had to drag me in here,” he joked, pointing to Silva, who was concentrating on her painting. “What I really want to do is learn how to make a portrait.”

The former mechanic and machinist at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology used to work in the machine shop at the college. At the art program, he utilized his hands in a dif-

ferent way, creating a dramatic sunset in a half an hour. Purple mixed with rose overtones to accent the mood he was trying to create.

His wife, Silva, painted a seascape. Her turquoise sea cascaded over black rock formations while the sun glowed in the distance.

“This is my first time painting,” she said. “I just wanted to do it. The instructor is so nice, and the experience was so great with my friends.”

“As you get older, you might feel isolated,” Clinton said as she encouraged each painter. “Next time I am giving you each a box of paints to take home. I want you to remember when you were young playing in the sandbox. Just open yourself up and play with the paints. Get creative.”

Clinton, an artist and art instructor for two decades, has been teaching at the MAC for the past ten years. She said she never thought she would be an artist until her friend, Paul Nolan, convinced her to come to his art class. Later he told her to enter a painting into a competition at City Hall.

Little did she know that her work would win the prestigious Grumbacher Award for first place, and that she

would win four years in a row. That bit of encouragement changed her life, which is what Clinton said she hopes she can do for her students.

“I have one student who began painting at 92, and she won the City Hall competition,” Clinton said. “Everyone has amazing talents inside them.”

Janice Kelly painted a lighthouse, with her cat, Harry, walking on the shore.

“I had to add in Harry,” she said. “He is the friendliest cat you’d ever see.”

Val Davis participated in the class in addition to serving as an RSVP volunteer. She said she had painted in school, but never took it up professionally.

“Art is a form of communication,” she said. “It really moves me and brings about a state of transformation.”

She described the purple tones she used as reminding her of tulips, while the black figures were birds flying through a meadow accentuated by a pale green.

“The horizontal strokes bring out the peacefulness of the water,” Davis explained.

“We are meant to create and to bring out the gifts that are endowed in us,” Davis said. “This class is the perfect setting for that.”

effect on the generation to come.”

Michel urged the community to think about joining together to invest in a cooperative to share in solar power opportunities.

“Hyde Park is not a rich community,” he said. “Everyone is working two jobs. There is no such thing as a stay-at-home parent, or it’s rare.

“You could find a place where everyone could benefit from the same solar power,” Michel continued. “If you put up panels on this church building, you would generate more power than it needs and build up credits. If everyone agreed to put up a panel, whether they decided to lease or buy, we could generate enough power for the neighborhood.”

He added that more could be done with wind turbines in urban areas, such as the IBEW tower in Dorchester.

While Daye cautioned against large towers dotting the neighborhoods, Michel said there are much more compact models nowadays.

“They have gone from large windmill things to small rotating towers,” Michel explained.

“We are fighting for environmental justice,” he said.

Should I Claim Benefits at Age 67 if I'm working?

Dear Rusty: My wife and I were talking to some other senior citizens who say it would be more beneficial to start drawing social security when I turn 67 next year, rather than wait till 70, even if I work full time. Can I do that? Signed: Working Senior

Dear Working Senior: Yes, you can do that, but it may not be your best strategy. Let's explore your options:

If your wife is already collecting Social Security on her work record, you might consider filing a "restricted application for spousal benefits only" and collect a spousal benefit from your wife, while continuing to delay your claim for your own benefit, thus allowing your benefit to continue to grow. You can do this because you were born before 1/2/1954, which is the cutoff date for filing in this manner. In this way you could collect 50% of the benefit your wife is entitled to at her full retirement age (FRA) until such time as you file for your own benefit. If you wait until age 70 to file for your own, your payment will be 24% more than it will be when you are 67. But you cannot use this option unless, or until, your wife is collecting her Social Security benefit from her own work record.

There is no simple answer to when you should claim. It depends upon your current financial needs, your current health and your anticipated longevity (considering your family history). If you anticipate a long healthy life and don't urgently need the money, then waiting until age 70 to claim your benefit will not only give you the highest possible monthly payment but also the most in lifetime benefits (assuming you live to at least the "average" age (84 for a man today). Waiting until 70 will also ensure that your wife gets the highest possible survivor benefit, should you predecease her (at her FRA, your surviving spouse gets 100% of the amount you were receiving at your death).

As for you working, since you've reached your full retirement age you no longer need to worry about Social Security's "earnings test" which takes back benefits from anyone whose earnings exceed a certain limit. But it would be wise to consider that Social Security benefits are subject to Federal Income Tax (and, depending upon where you live, possibly a State income tax), so adding your Social Security income to your earnings from work

could be an important tax consideration for you.

Claiming your benefit at age 67 will give you a payment which is 8% more than you would have gotten at age 66. But if the factors discussed above suggest you should wait longer, then you'll earn an additional 8% for each additional year you wait to claim your benefit, up to age 70 when your maximum benefit is reached. What is the downside to waiting? Well, only that your wife, if she will be eligible for a spousal benefit from you, cannot collect that spousal benefit until you start collecting your own benefit. Your wife's spousal benefit would be half of your age 66 benefit if she claims at her full retirement age.

So, as you can see, there is no easy answer to whether you should claim Social Security at age 67, but with the above information you should be able to make an informed decision. And here's one final suggestion: don't take Social Security advice from "armchair experts" and don't be swayed by those who might say "collect now because Social Security is going bankrupt." It's not. It's true that Congress needs to fix some portions of the program soon, and it's also true they've been dragging their collective feet to do so. But, historically, Congress has always stepped up to the task when they had to, and I'm confident they will eventually do so again.

1:30 p.m. on Vermont Route 103 near the location where the victim's body was discovered Friday evening in his vehicle around 5:45 p.m. in Rockingham.

The Vermont State Police would like to speak to anyone who saw the Katsiroubas Produce truck on Vermont Route 103 on Friday afternoon, including anyone who may have observed anything suspicious with the truck or with any other vehicles operating near the truck. People with any potential information are asked to call the state police barracks in Westminster at 802-722-4600.

Last year, Fonseca-Rivera was sentenced by U.S. District Court Judge Denise Casper to one year and one day in prison and three years of supervised release after pleading guilty to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine. The investigation started in January of 2015, in which the United States Attorney's Office of the District of Massachusetts states that Fonseca and four co-defendants in the case received more than 30 suspicious packages believed to be cocaine sent from Puerto Rico.

Katsiroubas Brothers released a statement from Ted Katsiroubas saying it was felt by their company that Fonseca-Rivera had served his time and was a good employee. They hired him back when he was released from prison earlier this year.

"We are deeply saddened to learn of the tragic death of our dedicated, kind and reliable co-worker, Robert Fonseca-Rivera," Ted Katsiroubas stated. "We learned in the past few hours that the Vermont State Police suspect foul play in Roberto's death. We hope the investigation is quick and successful. We want justice for Roberto."

Katsiroubas stated that Fonseca-Rivera helped the company and his fellow co-workers whenever he could.

"Roberto's smiling, outgoing presence always brightened our days," he stated. "This was a man who would stay after work and help co-workers repairing their vehicles. The Katsiroubas family, which has been in business for 105 years, is deeply concerned for the safety and well-being of our employees. We are arranging for counselors to be on hand to help employees as long as they are in need to deal with this tragedy."

Cashman with 3,883 votes (58 percent) to his 2,724 votes (41 percent). Liz Breadon now joins District 8 winner Priscilla Kenzie Bok and At-Large winner Julia Mejia to make the Boston City Council officially a female-majority body, with eight women to five men.

Mejia snuck by however at 22,464, beating St. Guillen by literally 10 votes if the unofficial results stand as of Wednesday, Nov. 6.a St. Guillen has called for a recount that has yet to be decided as of the date of publication.

"I am humbled to be your first Afro-Latina immigrant woman councilwoman," she said in a statement. "This campaign was never about me though. It was always about bringing power to the

Dorchester native Erin Murphy came in next with 16,843 votes and 8.38 percent, Althea Garrison followed with 16,161 votes at 8.04 percent and David Halbert finished with 13,201, or 6.57 percent.

There were 66,844 total bal-

lots cast and, taking into account the number of registered voters in the September preliminary election, is a very low figure. There were 402,536 total registered voters in the City of Boston as of September 24, and the vote total represents about 16 percent of those registered.
