TM ends with Lenox out, Morse in

The Annual and Special Town Meetings of Norwood ended on May 12 with the zoning amendment proposed for 83 Morse St. approved and the amendment for 259 Lenox St. sent back to the Planning Board.

While both proposals were different, they seemed to have strikingly similar goals: to erect more than 150 units of multi-family housing in Norwood. The owners of the Lenox property proposed rezoning 259 Lenox to allow for 185 units of housing on a two-acre lot (whereas Morse had about 18 acres) directly adjacent to the Norwood Central Commuter Rail Station.

Each proposal called for a zoning overlay district (ZOD) which would basically allow

for two new multi-family rental buildings to be constructed at said addresses.

Many residents spoke in favor of or against both projects.

Resident and former Zoning Board of Appeals member (but not a Town Meeting member) Patrick Mulvehill spoke against both projects, stating that the Town does not need more apartment complexes that, according to him, soak up resources and overburden the schools. He said the zoning for the area was completely inconsistent with the proposed zoning overlay.

Mulvehill brought up the relatively recent Chapter 40B saga the Town dealt with seven or so years ago. Basically, Chapter 40B of the Massachusetts General Laws requires that a municipality have 10 percent of its hous-

ing stock affordable or 1.5 percent of its land area dedicated to affordable housing, otherwise a developer can come in and build housing that skirts most local zoning laws. The Town voted to buy Forbes Hill Mansion in 2017 to stop one proposal, but was unable to stop Avalon Bay.

"In essence, this is a 40B application because he's asking for every waiver that a 40B asks for and had to have been given," he said. "Can anybody in their right mind say that we need more apartments in this Town? That's what the Planning Board in essence is saying. 'Come on down,' as Ernie said, or Bob Barker or Rob Roddy. 'Come on down, we're open for business,' when I thought the door was shut. Mark Ryan, the En-

off one of the Town's fire trucks to interested attendees.

This event happened as a result of Norwood Public Schools wanting to have a more inclusive school district where students with and without disabilities could play sports together and become friends with each other. Karen Hurley, Norwood Public Schools physical therapist, said that Norwood "became a unified district with Special Olympics, so we decided to extend it to the whole community." Norwood started participating in the Unified Champion Schools program in 2021, which was founded in

150th to honor vets ahead of Memorial Day

The Norwood 150th Anniversary continues this week. On Sunday, May 22, there will be a multi-location celebration of Norwood's veterans.

The event is scheduled from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. simultaneously at the Town Hall at 566 Washington St., at the Senior Center at 275 Prospect St., the Norwood High School at 245 Nichols St. and at the Norwood Civic Center at 165 Nahatan St. The idea is to collect and tell the stories of

Norwood's many veterans. There will be storyboards, storytellers, reenactments, performances, an orchestra and more.

According to 150th Steering member Anne Haley, "Way back, almost two years ago, we were discussing what types of things we wanted to put our efforts into. I had been at a presentation at the Morse House on one Veterans Day and I had contributed my dad's picture and I thought that was a wonderful way for people to learn about our veterans and our history," she said.

gineering Department, Andy Murphy, Sarah, we scratched and clawed to get to 1.5 percent. The Selectmen were on Board, everybody. And now we're here again, with our mandate being met by the Town and it's growing to 1.8 percent with the Bernie Park and whatnot? So I find it disheartening that I'm here arguing against this project when we don't have to say yes to it."

Mulvehill said later that he's not against apartments – he said he in fact lives in one – but he's against apartment complexes.

Town Meeting member John Hall spoke in favor of Lenox, saying that Norwood's history is full of multi-family rental housing.

"In about the 1920s, and the reason why Norwood grew so fast was the interest in multi-family housing/workers barracks in the rapidly-growing manufacturing sector," he said. "Workers barracks tended to be built near the places where people were going to work, and so much of the Town didn't really notice or happen to take note whether they liked it or didn't like it, it was just something that was happening over there that allowed the factories to run."

Hall called out the Town of Norwood's slogan as potentially inaccurate, as he said the Town is becoming so expensive many college graduates and working young people cannot afford to go to "The Town Everyone Returns To."

"We want the people who want to stay in Norwood after they finish their schooling to have a place to live when they start their own households," he

said. "They can't simply replace their parents, their parents don't die that fast. Okay? And the empty nesters need places as well, they can't simply chop their house in half and rent out half and stay in half. It just doesn't work that way."

Hall also pointed out that fears of overburdening the municipal systems may be unfounded. He said that apartments generally have a lower occupation rate nationally than single-family homes when it comes to families, so schools are not likely to be disproportionately affected.

"When you think about it, apartments have a disproportionate attraction for empty nesters, for young families starting out that haven't had kids yet, that kind of thing, but it is less of a burden on schools than an equal number of housing units of traditional single-family houses," he said. "The second objection that is common is traffic. People in apartments tend to own fewer cars and take fewer trips. You notice the traffic impact right around where the apartment building is, but if you had the same number of housing units distributed around the Town, you would find the traffic more distributed but every bit as large, if not larger. There are concerns about crime and that's completely mistaken. Crime rates are not a bigger issue with apartment dwellers than they are with single-family people."

Hall then attacked probably one of the most brought-up arguments against multi-family housing.

"There's also a concern about resale value," he said. "There

have only been a couple of studies concerning the value of your house appreciating around multi-family housing, and it's murky data, it's hard to sort through, but the conclusion of the studies that have been done is your appreciation goes up more and faster if there are multi-family residences around as well."

Board of Selectmen Chair Bill Plasko offered a motion to send the Lenox Street proposal back to the Planning Board for further review, citing problems with the application and that several changes were made just before Town Meeting.

"Some changes can be made on the Town Meeting floor, but quite honestly, zoning matters should be brought to us, in my opinion, in a final state that we can understand, vote up or down, but it just gets complicated to make a lot of changes on Town Meeting floor," he said.

Plasko added public notification was also an issue with the Lenox proposal.

"We've also talked to some neighbors who said they never had any notification of the public hearings, and I know they're legally published but I think at the last several Town Meetings we've asked the Planning Board to reach out beyond what's legally required and I think that should be emphasized again," he said.

Town Meeting voted to send the proposal back to the Planning Board for Lenox Street.

For Morse Street, Town Meeting voted to approve the zoning measure, which would allow a 150-unit building to be built there pending the approval of the Norwood Planning Board through a special permit.

She said it's also a tradition that has continued up at the Norwood Senior Center for years now as well, and a big Townwide event just made sense.

"I thought, it's the Norwood 150, we should do this really big and from this our public gets a new look at our veterans, a new look at our history and we have a whole generation, my dad's generation, that is fading out on us that has so many stories to tell," she said.

Norwood is known as "The Town Everyone Returns To," but Haley said the Norwood connection can create community wherever Norwoodians get together.

"One of the things I loved is how many of the men and women from Norwood met up with each other in World War II in all of the different campaigns," she said. "Every time I'd talk to a veteran, they'd say, 'Oh so-and-so and I met up over there and we grew up across the street from each other.' And so these are just wonderful stories and I don't want to lose them and I thought this was a good way to introduce the younger generations to how brave these young people were and their history and their families' history and how their families felt while they were away."

Speakers, stories and storyboards will be at all four locations, with the day culminating in the Parkway Orchestra performing at 3 p.m. at the Norwood High School.

Haley said they are looking for as many people as possible to come to hear and tell the stories of Norwood's fighters. She said she is excited about the event and that Town officials have been extremely helpful in getting it off the ground.

"The Civic Center, Memorial Hall, the Senior Center, and then absolutely topping off the day to be able to have the Parkway Concert Orchestra and the music that they are going to be playing," she said. "I just love it. I get a little teary-eyed about the whole thing."

And Haley said the best part about the event is that it is 100 percent paid for and supported by the 150th Steering Committee.

"It's basically sponsored by everyone who donated to the Norwood 150 Celebration," she said. "It's sponsored by everyone who gave \$5 or \$25,000."

For Memorial Day, May 30, events will start at 8 a.m. at the St. Catherine of Siena Church at 549 Washington St. At 9 a.m., the American Flag on the Town Common will be raised and flown at half-staff. The ceremonies at Old Parish Cemetery, 480 Washington St., will start immediately after. The Memorial Day Parade will step off at 10 a.m. at the corner of Washington and Howard Streets and go to Highland Cemetery.

The parade will feature Police and Fire Honor Guards, Norwood veterans, the Norwood High School Marching Band, the Colonial Boys Fife and Drum Band, the Colonial Pipers Bagpipe Band, and the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Brownies.

Norwood Veterans Agent Ted Mulvehill said he's appreciative of the celebration before Memorial Day, and also that he's honored to once again be organizing the remembrance of the Fallen. He said this year will include a special remembrance of Norwood's Vietnam Veterans at the James Sansone Memorial at the corner of Washington Street and East Hoyle. Mulvehill said nine Norwood residents served during the Vietnam conflict.

"Of the nine men, eight of them came home to their families, but Jimmy Sansone did not come home," he said. "Unfortunately, he was lost at sea and is still missing in action. So we thought it was kind of special to recognize his extra service by honoring his service and that of all Norwood Vietnam Veterans at his corner memorial site."

Mulvehill said there will be a short remembrance at the site, including a word or two from keynote speaker Congressional Medal of Honor winner and retired Navy Captain Thomas G. Kelley from South Boston.

"He'll offer his remarks. I'll be very brief with my remarks, which will mostly center on where these men are on the Vietnam Memorial Wall down in D.C.," he said. "And just thanking the families of veterans. I've been in contact with five out of the nine – the others will be extremely difficult – but there will be a family presence there for five of the nine families. It's just going to be nice. It's not going to be a long, drawn-out ceremony. No politicians, just veterans honoring veterans."

Morrill Library Board discusses Covid contingency plans

The Morrill Memorial Library Board of Trustees met recently and discussed what's ahead for the library this summer.

The question of COVID precautions and fallback plans came up, as Massachusetts and the U.S. are both experiencing an uptick in cases right now. Library Director Clayton Cheever said he has been speaking with Health Department Director Stacey Lane regularly to keep informed of case information.

"So as things are continuing to develop, we have open lines of communication to make sure we're acting in coordination with the rest of the Town," he said.

Head of Youth Services Kate Tigue gave a rundown of her current efforts within the library, in-

cluding Youth Services' plans for in-person programming and contingency plans for if that becomes unfeasible.

"We never really went back to full capacity," she said. "If you were ever with us before COVID, we used to have these kind of giant, chaotic but really fun story times and indoor programs, which were wonderful, but we've never really gone back to that. We've been working on how we're going to manage crowd size in the Simoni Room because there is really high demand. We haven't really heard from patrons that they want us to step back and not let as many people in the room. It's actually been the opposite, where we have to take the reins on that."

Tigue said they have been limiting events through a ticketing system. She said they are still

keeping many COVID precautions active, like making sure meeting rooms are well-ventilated.

"Our custodians are great about helping us out with that and so we always keep the windows open," she said, adding that they are not using smaller rooms for programming because they cannot properly ventilate them.

Tigue said they're also working on offering outdoor programming. She said they're not looking to increase offerings right now unless it's outdoor programming.

"One thing to note is that now that we're getting into the better weather, we have applied to the

Wonderful Women of Norwood

Anna R. Ellis

The Norwood Historical Society would like to present Anna R. Ellis as a Wonderful Woman of Norwood.

Anna Rachel Ellis was born in Norwood to John and Harriet Ellis on July 5, 1877. She attended Norwood schools and when she graduated in 1895, she was asked by then Postmaster William Wallace to fill a part-time summer clerk position at the Norwood Post office located in the Wheelock Block, in the business center of Norwood. Anna agreed, and even though she had taken courses that would have allowed her further studies, she stayed with the post office in Norwood for the next forty-nine years.

The post office in Norwood was established in 1846 when Norwood was still South Dedham, by Captain Moses Guild and was in Jabez Boyden's general store. It consisted of a three-foot high cylindrical alphabetized letter rack where you just turned to find your mail under the appropriate letter. This postal rack can still be viewed at the Norwood Historical Society headquarters, The Fred Holland Day House, 93 Day St. When Norwood was incorporated in 1872, Willard Gay became Norwood's first postmaster.

Anna served as a clerk in all positions of the post office under five postmasters. She was hired by Willard Wallace who served from 1886 to 1903. Frank Fales was postmaster from 1903 until 1916 and it was under Mr. Fales that Norwood became the first post office in Massachusetts to offer the United States Postal Savings System. Anna became the first postal savings clerk.

The United States Postal Savings System was formed after intense lobbying by farmers, workers, and immigrants that had distrust for the banks at that time. It offered a savings plan that at the time was

more secure than banks and returned a 2% interest to those who used it. It also provided protection for these savings during the Great Depression as it was insured and backed by the government and not banks. Anna administered this operation until 1919, when, under postmaster Joseph McManus, she was appointed as assistant postmaster.

Anna served as Assistant Postmaster under Joseph McManus (1916-1924), under postmaster Albion Parker (1924-1933), and then under Thomas Mullvehill (1933-1936). Along with her duties of assistant postmaster she oversaw the postal carriers and the postal savings system.

In 1931, during Thomas Mullvehill's tenure as postmaster, Congressman Richard Wigglesworth notified Norwood that a recommendation had been made to the House Appropriations Committee that a new post office be built in Norwood. An amount of \$130,000.00 was appropriated for this endeavor. This set off a

contentious town discussion on the location for the new building. It was finally decided in October of 1931 that the site of the old Everett School, where Anna Ellis attended school, was the best place for the new building. Guild Street was opened and extended, and architect William Upham designed the neo-federal building that stands today.


During the building postmaster Thomas Mullvehill was taken ill and Anna Ellis was appointed acting postmaster in 1933 and was charged with the transfer, administration, and opening of the new building. She served in this position until late in 1934. When Mr. Mullvehill died in December of 1936, she was again appointed acting postmaster until being appointed postmaster in August of 1937.

Anna Ellis served as Postmaster/Postmistress until she retired in 1944, during which time she was responsible for the expansion of the carriers in town to eleven, the adding of postal machines, and the institution of parcel post for packages. Anna R Ellis died the following year in December 1945 at the age of 68. She left a sister Rachel Ellis, and an incredible forty-nine years of service to the town of Norwood.

Board of Selectmen to do a bunch of programming outside at the Bond Street Tot Lot, and so that's great for people who don't feel comfortable coming inside or who have immuno-compromised children and can't quite make it in, and I think we're starting that in June," she said. "And so that will be great."

Tigue also discussed the youth programming at the library she's been running. She said the return to in-person programming has been largely successful, if a bit hectic.

"In-person programming has actually kind of taken over our lives since we started in January," she said. "Over the last about six months, we've gone nonstop. Typically we usually start a six-to-eight-week session, take a break and then start another one, but there was such great demand that we kind of kept going. This week is the first week we've taken a break since the start of in-person programming in January."

Tigue said they have also had much success with the library's craft kit program, which was designed as a way for the library to provide activities to families during the pandemic. She said it be-

came extremely popular.

"It's been over 2,000 kits that we've assembled," she said. "And they're still really popular even though we're doing in-person programming. There's no sign of that slowing down at all. I definitely thought there would be, but people love that so we'll keep doing it."

Tigue said for the summer, they are looking ahead to the Youth and Children's Summer Reading Program, as well as coming up with objectives and goals for the Library Master Plan. She said community literacy was one of the objectives that the library should focus on.

"We've been really working on making some community connections and working with other social service agencies in Norwood to kind of meet some patrons where we haven't yet," she said.



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Art in the Park returning

The Norwood Art Association's (NAA) 45th annual Art in the Park celebration is coming back to the Norwood Town Common from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 11.

NAA President Frannie Downey said she and the entire organization have been looking forward to the event basically since 2020.

"It's awesome, we're really happy and really excited and we can't wait to get out there and be together again and just celebrate being with each other," she said. "Hopefully, folks got to enjoy preparing some new art pieces for the show during COVID."

The entire COVID-19 pandemic was and still is a huge impact on everyone's lives, and while not all of the outcomes have been completely negative,

Downey said the quarantine affected everyone differently. And while there might have been some folks out there writing their new manuscript or painting an intricate masterpiece, there were also artists who felt the same energy drain and loneliness that many faced during the pandemic. But she added that doesn't seem to have created shortage of pieces for this year's show.

"You know, I talked to a lot of the artists and some were just so not motivated during COVID. They didn't paint, but over the last couple of months they've been getting back into it," she said. "We're just excited to be back together."

Downey said there will also be a Kits' Table set up to "encourage tomorrow's artists," with projects and face painting. Local music will also be provided, and the winner of the annual NNA Inez Reardon Memorial Scholarship will also be announced. The Inez Reardon Scholarship is a tradition dating back decades in honor of one of the founders of the NAA, and will be presented to a graduating Norwood High School (NHS) student looking to take a stab at the arts in their continuing education.

"We just got the information from the Norwood High School last week and we have

picked someone, so we're going to let them know which piece it is," she said, adding that they pick all art anonymously. "We don't know who it is yet, as for us it's all just numbers right now but we'll be letting the school know at least which student we picked."

Downey said they will not announce until after NHS' graduation ceremony. The actual scholarship presentation will take place at noon at the Town Common.

The NAA was started back in the 70s and has been supported by the public, the Boch Memorial Fund and the Massachusetts and Norwood Cultural Councils. Anyone locally can join, even if you're not from Norwood. Downey added that they are always looking for volunteers and/or new members. 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


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
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
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**OLD PARISH CEMETERY

2008 in collaboration between Special Olympics and the US Office of Special Education Programs at the Department of Education. Hurley said that Norwood now has a unified bas-

ketball team at the high school, and there was a unified field day at the elementary school.

Patti Doherty from Massachusetts Special Olympics spoke highly of the event. She

said that while 240 schools in 150 towns in Massachusetts have a unified program, this is the first town that she knows of that was hosting an event for everyone, not only people who attend the particular school district. She said it's been "amazing" working in Norwood, with administrators, teachers, and students all participating.

Doherty said that "We brought in a Unified Champion School District last year. The strategy is to intentionally include students with and without ID [intellectual disability] in sports, leadership, and whole school events," and that they hope to create "meaningful inclusion and meaningful friendships." She also noted that "this is a first for the community, really creating something within the community that really brings in the younger students," instead of the more common model where most inclusive activities are only at the high school level.

Special Education Parent Advisory Council co-chairs Jen Wilds and Nancy Doherty said they were both happy with the event and said they hope that there continue to be more inclusive events in Norwood. Doherty said that "it's more important for the general public to be inclusive of people with disabilities than for disabled people

to somehow include themselves."

She also said that while people are usually familiar with issues of racism and sexism, they're not as familiar with ableism, which is discrimination and prejudice against disabled people, and she hopes events like the Unified Community Day can raise more awareness of issues like that.

Norwood parent Stephanie West said that it's "awesome that all families are included." She said she received a flier from her children's elementary school. Another family was from North Attleboro, having heard about the event from the special education school their son attends in Walpole. Sarah LaFerriere, special education teacher at Norwood High School, was there to volunteer at the snack table. "I have a lot of students involved with the Unified Program," she said. "I think it's an amazing opportunity." She added she is appreciative of how it allows her students to make more friends with students from the general education population.

Norwood Police Detective Jenn Hoyle was there also, along with several other members of the Norwood Police Department. She said the police department really got involved last year, and discussed an event known as the Torch Run,

where they went around to each school with a lit torch that was then passed from student to student and from school to school. This torch run was to kick off the beginning of the Norwood Unified District.

"We take pride in being part of the acceptance and inclusion," Hoyle said.

Paul Ronco from the Norwood Fire Department has been working with Norwood Public Schools for 11 years.

"I do all the fire education in schools," he said. He said he thinks the new efforts with the Unified District have absolutely made a difference in inclusivity. Norwood Fire also participated in the torch run last year.

According to the Massachusetts Department of Education, in the 2021-2022 school year Norwood had 781 students with disabilities, including 25 with intellectual disability, 133 with autism, and 122 with a developmental delay.




