Roxbury Prep files Letter of Intent

Roxbury Prep announced last Friday it has filed its Letter of Intent (LOI) to start the public process to build its new high school at 361 Belgrade Ave.

The project will have to go through the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) Article 80 Large Project Review process, which will mean a host of public meetings and the creation of an Impact Advisory Group (IAG). The IAG will be made of up residents from the neighborhood appointed by Boston Mayor Marty Walsh, and if the pre-file and community meetings of this year and last are any indication, a bunch of very well-attended public

meetings are to come.

The plan is to put their new high school at the current location of Clay Auto. The location is technically in Roslindale, but sits right on the border of West Roxbury. All local elected officials, District 5 City Councilor Tim McCarthy, District 6 City Councilor Matt O'Malley, At-Large City Councilor Michael Flaherty, At-Large City Councilor Annissa Essaibi-George, State Rep. Edward Coppinger, State Rep. Angelo Scaccia and State Sen. Michael Rush have come out in opposition to the project.

Elizabeth Wallace of the Greater Belgrade Neighborhood Association said they are also still opposed to the

District Candidates' Forum held in Roslindale

On Thursday evening, May 3, Progressive West Roxbury/Roslindale, along with co-sponsors RISE (Roslindale Is For Everyone), Roslindale Village Main Streets, and the Southwest Boston Community Development Corporation (SWBCDC), hosted a forum for the four candidates running for the State Representative seat for the 14th Suffolk District.

The forum, held in the Washington-Beech Community Room, drew approximately 50 people and ran for an hour and a half.

The format of the program had the candidates (with the exception of last minute entry Virak Uy, who was given

three minutes to introduce himself at the end of the forum) individually go before the audience, spend five minutes introducing themselves, and then spend 20 minutes answering questions from the sponsors or from members of the group, who would write them on index cards and hand them over to be read by the moderator.

Leading off the candidates was incumbent and Hyde Park native Angelo Scaccia, who had asked to go first because of a prior commitment.

Standing before the audience for his slightly abbreviated session, the Dean of the House spoke of issues important to him – including the proposed “Millionaires’ Tax” and fully funding char-

Bellevue Tower opens to residents

The Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) celebrated May as Preservation Month on Saturday by opening the doors to the Bellevue Water Tower in West Roxbury.

The structure was built more than 100 years ago in 1915, and DCR Representative Wendy Pearl said it was a living monument to the idea of civic infrastructure at the time.

“The history of water in Boston, well there have been books upon books written on that and it’s pretty interesting,” she said. “It was the golden age

of civic works in terms of how Boston was building up its institutions to support the growing population and provide public services.”

Pearl pointed out to residents the difference between the 1915 construction and the more recent water tower. She said the original tower was built to stand as a testament to Boston’s commitment to residents and was built to be seen, while the sky blue tower of later years was built to blend into the background.

“It was the idea that civic works can be beautiful and should express the pride in the community and the pride in government,” she said.

ter schools – in budgetary terms because, he said, “from the budget, everything else flows. Money is what it’s all about up there.”

When asked of his greatest legislative accomplishment during this current session, Scaccia cited bringing an extra \$98 million to the mental health budget and adding “much, much more” to the opiate addiction budget, with plans by late 2020 to provide enough 14 and 21-day treatment centers to meet current needs of those battling addiction.

Scaccia also responded to a question asked to candidates throughout the evening regarding the Safe Communities Act, which was proposed as a defense against non-criminal immigrant deportation and was never brought to a vote in the House.

“I would like to see it pass,” Scaccia said. “But ‘he’ has said it’s not going anywhere.”

“He,” Scaccia said, was Speaker of the House – though still unnamed – Robert DeLeo.

“The issue that I have up in the Legislature today is that we have a dictatorship,” Scaccia continued. “If he doesn’t want something to go, it doesn’t go.”

When asked how he might deal with the situation productively, he responded.

“I just said that when the Speaker says the issue is not coming, it ain’t coming,” Scaccia said. “Now, what can I do when that happens? Try to challenge the Speaker and try to get him removed? I don’t think that works.”

Speaking of the political shift in the House, his poor relationship with the Speaker, his consequential decrease in influence (he cited his removal from all of the big chairs), but the fact that he still has a voice that he continues to exercise, Scaccia answered.

“What can I do as a single individual? I’m going to do it tonight,” he said. “I’m going to help a young kid who

could get elected who’s not afraid to get up and speak. That’s what we need in the House today: more people that will get up and speak, whether they lose or not. I’ve gotten used to losing most of my life, but every once in awhile, you win.”

After some words from the sponsors, Representative Scaccia was followed by Gretchen Van Ness. The civil rights/social justice attorney/activist sat at the front table facing the audience and went into detail about her career.

“When I went into law practice that was my focus: to help people who had suffered from any kind of discrimination or harassment,” Van Ness said. “So, I’ve worked as a plaintiff’s lawyer representing people who need representation, still to this day, because we have not solved these issues.”

The Hyde Park resident went on to list a number of other local issues she intended to focus on if elected, including, but not limited to, airplane noise, the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and other state agencies, public transportation issues.

Asked about her top three priorities if elected, Van Ness responded with education and education funding reform, criminal justice reform, and increasing the state government’s role in “protecting its people from the excesses of the federal government.”

“We could have been proactive and ready to stand up and protect the people of this Commonwealth, and our environment, and our institutions,” Van Ness said.

Addressing the Safe Communities Act, Van Ness spoke of the necessity for progressives to work together to make it happen, referencing her own experience working on issues now largely taken for granted that were not always so certain.

“I bring a lifetime of experience arguing before judges, working on media-

tion, being at the US Supreme Court, being in our state Supreme Court, talking about some really, really tough issues. And some of the time I’ve actually been able to change people’s minds,” she said in support of her ability to bring about progressive change.

Other questions had to do with legislative transparency, strategies for winning the election, differences between her politics and Scaccia’s, and affordable housing.

Regarding the last topic, Van Ness put forward that the housing crisis was, in addition to being the result of high prices, also a product of repressed wages, high student debt, and the City’s lack of respect for neighborhood zoning codes.

She went on to suggest that Community Preservation Act funds could be used to convert old industrial buildings into affordable housing rather than into luxury condominiums.

In his introductory remarks, Shegun Idowu spent his time thanking a litany of people and organizations, from his teachers at Latin Academy, to his classmates at Morehouse College in Atlanta, to Councilor Charles Yancey (for whom he worked), to the Edward M. Kennedy Center (where he later worked), to the NAACP (for which he is currently the chapter Vice-President). Using this method, he presented a snapshot of his background.

In the question and answer period that followed, Idowu shared his thoughts on income equality, the environment, and affordable housing. He said that “climate change is the issue of our time,” and recommended restoring the Jim Brooks Stabilization Act.

Speaking about criminal justice reform as a way to keep people out of jail “who shouldn’t be there to begin with,” Idowu cited the police body camera movement that he had spearheaded.

“When we started that effort four years ago, the whole thing was not just about preventing the murders of black and brown people... but also ensuring

that our officers were not abusing their authority,” he said.

Idowu also remarked on the Safe Communities Act moving forward.

“I think that legislators should be willing to put themselves on the line, put their own bodies on the line, not just show up at the courthouse or the jail cell after someone’s been detained but if you know that it’s happening to yourself do what you can to stop it,” he said.

He went on to inform the group that he has been arrested protesting “so I’m happy to do it again because I think it’s incredibly important that you be willing to go all the way, in terms of arrest, in terms of putting your body on the line to protect people who should be allowed to remain in this state and not be whisked away.”

Much as with Van Ness, Idowu focused on the door-to-door strategy for mobilizing progressive voters, while also sharing some of Van Ness’ differences with Scaccia, while referring to themselves (and Virak Uy) as “loud progressives” unhappy with where they stand in terms of representation and looking to engage voters who may have become apathetic or disillusioned toward the status quo.

At the end of the program, a few minutes were put aside for Virak Uy who – like Idowu, Van Ness, and Scaccia – is a Hyde Park resident. During his brief remarks, the former Boston Public School teacher and current Middlesex Community College program director spoke strongly on education.

“A big part of the reason I’m running is because I want to advocate for adequate funding for our schools, teachers, and students so they can achieve their educational and career goals,” Uy said.

The primary for the 14th Suffolk District seat is on Sept. 4.

Parkway community hosting fundraiser for Scott Berry

The Parkway community has come out in force for Roslindale resident Scott Berry, who was injured in the March 8 nor'easter.

Berry is now paralyzed and may never walk again after a tree fell on him when he was cleaning up after the storm. The community has already

raised more than \$140,000 for him since a GoFundMe page was create to help his family make his home wheelchair accessible.

On May 19, friends and family are asking the community to come out and help him again, as more funds are needed for the family.

"We have the fundraiser on the 19th from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. We will have music,

raffles, silent auctions and a few live auctions of a couple of pretty good things," said organizer Adrian Gilmore. "We have a Patriots helmet signed by the entire 2017 team, a trip to Las Vegas for two for four days and David Copperfield tickets, a lot of very nice gifts. The community has been absolutely great

Editorial

BALANCING THE BOOKS

Every year, with the regularity of Swan Boats splashing into the lagoon, the same debate echoes through City Hall, although typically met with inaction.

The perpetual hot topic: Are local colleges and universities paying enough in taxes (or more specifically, payments in lieu of taxes)?

Under the so-called PILOT program, the city negotiates a flat fee that these institutions agree to pay instead of the full assessment of their property taxes. Boston City Councilor At-Large Annissa Essaibi George is among those questioning those deals, not on their merit, but because even the deeply discounted deals are not being paid.

According to the councilor, as quoted in the Boston Globe, schools paid only \$13 million of the \$27 million they agreed to in 2017. Northeastern University reportedly paid a paltry 23 percent of what it owed. Harvard, despite collecting billions of dollars in its endowment, paid about half of what it owed.

The time has come to scrap these arrangements and treat universities like any other business in the city. Let us disillusion you of any pretense that these schools are playing an out-sized philanthropic role. While they do deserve praise for the many ways they support the city and its residents, that largesse is not enough to justify their multi-million-dollar discounts, especially when even that reduced amount is not being paid.

Job creation? Sure, these schools do create many jobs here. Then again, so does McDonald's and we've never seen the city discount Big Macs and Chicken McNuggets.

Here is the only deal the city should pursue. Once tuitions stabilize for students, once assorted "fees" stop draining their savings, and when we can see evidence that expansionary efforts are not merely a land grab, then – and only then – should the city reconsider tax discounts.

As it is now students are paying for such things as UMass Amherst buying Mount Ida College for no real defensible purpose, leaving layoffs and displaced students as a repercussion.

Students are funding skyrocketing upper-echelon salaries. Allston might as well change its name to Harvard at the rate that school is gobbling up land that would otherwise be taxable at normal assessments and rates.

Our schools are a point of pride and valuable part of the social fabric here in Boston. They are also big businesses and it is hard to justify the deep tax discounts they receive.

The PILOT program has been debated many times before and, unfortunately, we can almost guarantee nothing will happen. At the very least, however, the city should be able to collect the money that is still owed. In this economy, there should be no corporate or college handouts.


Anyone knowledgeable about adages will not hesitate to fill in the above ellipsis with "unpunished."

Even if one is not canny with sayings but is an out-and-out cynic, "unpunished" will quickly come to mind. Those familiar with and believing in Isaiah 55 ("For My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways My ways," declares the Lord) will merely shrug, look heavenward, and state the obvious about our loving but inscrutable Creator: His/Her ways are beyond our understanding.

No matter what category into which you, dear reader, fall, your heart has to go out to one Scott Berry and his family, both immediate and extended. May his many good deeds in the community be reciprocated.

Very early on the morning of March 8, after he had cleared snow from his own South Street home, Scott was on his way to snow-blow his neighbors' sidewalks before reporting to his job at State Street Bank when an enormous limb from a city-owned tree thundered down on top of him. Unaware of the breaking sound because of the snow-blower's noise and his earbuds' music, he could only await his wife, Kristen, who heard his scream, ran to help him, and then phoned 911. The EMT's responded right away but had to then contact the fire department to help them remove the giant limb on top of him.

The Brigham and Women's large trauma team awaited the ambulance transporting Scott and his loving wife. The fast-acting medical staff detected three broken ribs, fractures of cervical vertebrae, and, worst of all, a severed spinal cord. After emergency surgery and several days in that storied hospital's ICU, Kristen had to

break the news to Scott that the chances were/are slim to none that he'll ever walk again because of the spinal cord severance.

Out of this tragedy immediately came immense, familial love. The five children of Jim and Teedee Sweeney of Roslindale's Guernsey Street have continued to show unmitigated love for their Scott. Their four other Sweeney children, Joe, John, Kate Smyth and Mary Ross, as well as their many grandchildren, have surrounded sister Kristen and husband Scott with what most families would consider unparalleled support and devotion. By their encouragement they have supported Scott's two children, Caitlyn and Chris, to continue their schooling at UMass Boston and University of Maryland in spite of the life-changing tragedy that befell their dad.

Scott is now in the Spaulding Rehabilitation Center in Charlestown participating in occupational and physical therapy. But the financial cost is and will be immense; the Christopher and Dana Reeve Foundation estimates that the lifetime costs of a 50-year-old living with paraplegia are over \$1.5 million.

Now is the time for the Bos-

ton community to begin to return the commitment that Scott showed to them all the years he spent co-founding and volunteering for Parkway Girls Softball League, Parkway Youth Hockey, and Parkway Flag Football.

Scott's wife is known in the community because of the nine years that she taught at Holy Name; Scott's mother-in-law, Teedee Sweeney, is a name recognized by many Don Bosco High School graduates. Scott's father-in-law, Jim Sweeney, is a retired Boston Public School shop teacher.

Hosting a fundraiser for Scott, the Sweeney and Berry families, together with their good friends, are asking kind-hearted people from the community, both near and far, to attend. It will be held at Holy Name Parish Hall on Saturday, May 19, from 6-11 p.m. There will be attractive silent auction items, raffles, music, food, and cash bar.

In the meantime, Jim's Brooklyn, daughter, Mary, has set up a GoFundMe page for brother-in-law Scott (<https://www.gofundme.com/596hj8w>). A Tyndale Street neighbor donated her vertical wheelchair lift for Jim and Teedee's house to accommodate temporary housing for Scott while renovations occur. Hopefully, enough money will be raised to provide for all the numerous and necessary renovations to the Berry home on South Street, as well as provide for the necessary medical equipment that Scott will need before the family can go home.

Let's get together for an amazing night to come to the aid of this well-loved Parkway family!

to reach out and help them in their time of need.”

Gilmore said a friend of hers was able to procure the helmet from the New England Patriots.

“It was a friend of mine. He got in touch with the Pats and they gave us the helmet and a Tom Brady shirt,” she said. “Mayor Marty Walsh donated the trip for two to Vegas. The community has just been outstanding; the stores in the community I’ve been reaching out to have also given out gift certificates for items. I’ve had a couple of restaurants in Charlestown reach out and send us dinner for four with a drink pairing where the owners themselves come out and sit with the customers and make their night great. People have been so unbelievable.”

Gilmore said she’s been friends with the Berrys for 15 years and she’s glad the community recognizes the need.

“They’re such good people. He’s got such a great personality so I think that’s going to help him,” she said. “His wife Kristen is such a strong woman and their kids are right behind them.”

The GoFundMe page can be found at gofundme.com/596hj8w and as of the date of publication is up to \$144,638. Gilmore said the outpouring of support since day one has been nothing short of a miracle.

“Mary Elizabeth Sweeney set that up looking to raise about \$10,000 and within two days it was within that goal,” she said. “We also have a friend whose son, Mark Delamere, was paralyzed, and she’s been guiding us all around, too. She told us people are going to want to give and they did. It was just amazing. Scott was just speechless when he saw the outreach for him because he didn’t expect it.”

Gilmore said they’ve also had support from the local business community, in that contractors have been stepping in to donate their time to build a new bathroom, an elevator, widening the doors and making the house accessible to Berry.

“It’s an amazing community we live in, I feel absolutely blessed,” she said.

project.

“We were made aware of Roxbury Prep’s filing of a letter of intent on May 4 with the BPDA,” she said. “The Greater Belgrade Avenue Neighborhood Association opposes this project as it is not an appropriate location for a school or any facility of the size proposed.”

Though many residents are opposed to the project, according to Roxbury Prep more than 1,600 Boston residents support the project. The argument for the high school is that Roxbury Prep currently houses their high school students in two locations and that does not allow them to have the amenities taken for granted by most high schools.

“Operating one high school out of two locations is not sustainable, and it does not provide students the educational program they deserve,” said Kate Armstrong, the Associate Chief Operating Officer at Roxbury Prep. “Given size constraints of the two existing temporary locations, we will be forced to move again next year, which will be our third move in four years. We are encouraged to see growing public support for our new school and are committed to being a good neighbor, just as we always

strive to be in our existing locations.”

Roxbury Prep also states they have about 100 students from the Parkway area. The school itself will have 28 classrooms, science labs, computer labs, a gymnasium, a theater and a cafeteria. Currently students have to eat their lunches at their desks. The school has 1,400 students in total including elementary, middle and high school.

Councilor Tim McCarthy said he likes the school and the school’s practices, but that he cannot support a project of this size on that lot.

“I’ve been to Roxbury Prep three or four times before they ever applied for this location,” he said. “It’s a tremendous school, and I got great responses speaking to some of the classes. I just think it’s the wrong location.”

The school is definitely short on space, as they have moved into a satellite school at 885 River Street in Hyde Park and are planning to open their doors there this fall. Representatives said that space will be inadequate to house the number of students they will have within a year or two.

McCarthy also said that while he does not dispute the idea of public transit taking care of regular commuting, he said planning and practice are two different things.

“They’ve got two schools and they’re trying to move students into one. The problem is they’ve got 96,000 square feet for 800 kids; anytime you have an event, that neighborhood is going to be

incredibly impacted,” he said. “Some of the talk is that most of the kids take the train but you know what? Life gets in the way of that, and the immediate neighborhood is going to be negatively impacted in a big, big way.”

McCarthy added that they can plan for public transit as much as they want, but adds that one major concern from the neighborhood is that of school athletic and theater events.

“Like I said in the public meeting, if you buy a house and you think you have enough closet space, you never do,” he said. “I think that’s what they’re trying to do now; they’re trying to justify a small, small space and say they’ll have enough room and I’m just not buying it. It’s just not the right location. I’m going to continue to work with the BPDA and the Roxbury Prep team to try to find another location.”

Ginny Gass of the Bellevue Hill Neighborhood Association (BHNA) said she and the organization are against the project, but that she does not preclude support for the school.

“I’m a proponent of charter schools, but that area is not a good location for a school of any kind that is as large as the proposed school is, and I speak for the BHNA on that,” she said. “We’re directing our folks to the BPDA web site so they can partake in the 30 day comment period, and we encourage them to express their opinions, pro or con. I do believe that most of our folks are against the project, but there may be some who are not and that’s fine.”

Pearl said water was one of the major issues in the early years of the 1800s, and that prior to 1848, residents were paying a private company or going to a well for water.

“You were working for your water, but on Oct. 25, 1848 they turned a tap and water from Lake Cochituate came to the Frog Pond,” she said. “More than 100,000 people celebrated, and they were all dressed to the nines, there were speeches, there was a poem read for the occasion by James Russel Lowell, who was a Cambridge poet and a contemporary of Longfellow, it was a big deal.”

Pearl said that despite the implementation of public water and the later installation of a concrete reservoir next to the

statehouse, Boston was still thirsty. The rapid increase in population in the late 1800s led to the original construction of the Bellevue Standpipe, which was a way to help pressurize water going to the taps.

Then construction began on the Water Tower in 1914. She said in one month, using manual labor and horse teams, they were able to dig a foundation for the tower that was well over 10 feet deep in places (the tower was built on a slope and the foundation was built to accommodate that slope).

“These were just simple machines, wenches and pulleys,” she said.

Pearl said the nearby Stony Brook reservation was the first park of the Metropolitan Parks

System (now DCR).

“We’re celebrating 125 years of park stewardship,” she said. “It was parkland and water supply because of the integration of all of those functions into the MPS region.”

Pearl said this year the tower will go back into use after two years of inspections and safety checks.

“This year it’s full, the last two years it’s been empty and (Massachusetts Water Resource Authority’s Eugene Gallagher) said before they put it back online, they had to do some piping improvements from the outside and they had to inspect the tank with a little robot they call a Geek, and the Geek gets to drive around the tank. He said when they went in there and opened it up, there was a painted interior and it was perfect, it didn’t need any work except for a regular cleaning and chlorination.”

Pearl said a nearby pipe from the Quabbin Reservoir feeds both towers, the newer being 2.5 million gallons and the original being 3 million gallons, to provide pressure to the city’s entire system.

“Basically, the City of Boston distributes the water from a central location, so this isn’t necessarily a pipe that connects to your kitchen sink but it pumps from the Quabbin,” she said. “This is the highest point in the City of Boston, 330 feet.”

Senior programs gain funds

The Boston City Council voted last week to accept \$130,253 last week as part of a grant for the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP).

The grant, provided by the Corporation for National and Community Services, will be administered to the Boston Elderly Services Commission (ESC) and will help provide 356 volunteers for elder care in the city by providing social support to homebound or older adults and individuals with disabilities by eligible seniors.

“The RSVP program will allow the Elderly Commission to recruit and train volunteers, which will aide in the transportation for our seniors, provide

free health insurance information to clients, teach English as a second language and provide critical support for our veterans and their families,” said At-Large City Councilor Ayanna Pressley. “This provides much-needed companionship to adults and respite to our caregivers. It is holistic in its socio-emotional economic services and engages a population of our city of 55 and over and wants to continue to engage in community.”

The idea is to get seniors out into the community to help other vulnerable populations. RSVP is designed to mobilize and organize senior volunteers mainly to the Boston Senior Companion Program and the National Senior Corps Volunteer Program, which in turn has many satellite programs. Basi-

cally, it’s seniors helping seniors and the city. Elderly Commission Communications Director Cassandra Baptista said it’s a great tool in the fight against elder isolationism.

“Since the 1970s, we’ve had companionship as one of our volunteer initiatives,” said Tyissha Jones-Horner, the Administrative Director of Volunteer Programs at the Commission on Affairs of the Elderly.

The program provides volunteer opportunities at such organizations in the city as Ethos, Ethos Greater Boston Chinese Golden Age, Grove Hall Community Center, Hebrew Senior Life HRCA, the Heritage House, Kit Clark JCHE- Volunteer Department, JFK Family Services- Charlestown, Kit

Bus Buddies give public transit a boost

The City of Boston Commission on Elderly Affairs (BCEA) is offering residents a helping hand in getting around the city.

The Bus Buddy Program, launched in the fall of last year, aims to pair seniors who have difficulty navigating the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) with experienced riders to get them where they need to go.

“We originally introduced our volunteer opportunities last April,” said Tyissha Jones-Horner, the Administrative Director of Volunteer Programs at the Commission on Affairs of the Elderly. “We spent the first couple of months in rounds of training, showing volunteers how to navigate through the MBTA.”

Jones-Horner said they started at the Broadway MBTA Station for the first bits of training. She said training not only involved information on the MBTA, but also how to interact with residents during their time on the T.

“They actually have a whole training facility that is just amazing, they teach the volunteer where all the safety gadgets are on the bus and it was a full 20 hours of training,” she said. “Safety call boxes, for instance; there are a lot of people that don’t know how to use one of those inside an MBTA vehicle.”

Jones-Horner said they also go over more traditional information like map reading, and she said this gives seniors access to any area in Massachusetts, not just Boston.

“They go over how to read the maps,” she said. “They pull out the maps of the entire state of Massachusetts and they show them where the routes connect, so they’re thoroughly knowledgeable about all of the different lines. If they meet up with a client, for example, and they say ‘I’m from Roslindale and I don’t have access to transportation and I want to go to the beach,’ they can teach them how to go to Wollaston Beach or Revere Beach. It’s not limited to Boston.”

Jones-Horner said they got the idea from volunteers in different programs and talking to senior residents in the community.

“What we heard in our conversations was that they were a little intimidated by the public transit system and a lot of them didn’t have access to transportation and that’s just how this came about,” she said.

Bus Buddies will also be able to teach residents the best times to travel, which is key in a city where rush hour can be an all-day affair.

“We do have a few people that have been interested thinking outside the box, we’ve been

Food delivery available for seniors

The Boston Commission for Elderly Affairs (BCEA) is getting seniors fed more easily with a program to deliver food.

“It was a need we noticed when there were older adults that frequented a lot of our food pantries around the city, but said it was cumbersome or too heavy to carry on their own,” said Tyissha Jones-Horner, the Administrative Director of Volunteer Programs at the Commission on Affairs of the Elderly. “A lot of them don’t have transportation.”

Jones-Horner said they now have a volunteer program, set up with the help of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) to help seniors get access to fresh and healthy foods from local food pantries.

“We have volunteers who go to food pantries like the ABCD in Mattapan, as well as a partnership with Fair Foods, and they pick up bags there and deliver them to seniors,” she said, adding that Fair Foods specializes in fresh organic produce. “We rolled that out in April of last year.”

Jones-Horner said the program is progressing, but they need help finding volunteers

and getting the word out.

“It’s helping tremendously,” she said. “These are people who are pretty much food insecure and being able to rely on that food once a month or week, we know that it’s helping and because it’s a federally-funded program, we do survey our clients or older adults that we deliver to in order to make sure we are doing what we set out to do.”

Jones-Horner said addressing food insecurity within the

aging population is extremely important for residents of Boston, as it allows more seniors to age-in-place and not have to go to senior living facilities.

“People are starting to learn about it more and more,” she said. “We have about 15 seniors we deliver to on a monthly basis and that’s continuing to grow day-by-day.”

Clark Day Health Alzheimer Program, MEMORY Cafe, VA Boston Healthcare System in West Roxbury and Jamaica Plain, Vine Street Senior Cafe and the YMCA Roxbury.

Jones-Horner said the program has changed since the ‘70s and is now more focused on helping individuals in one-on-one settings.

“We had to kind to rethink how our vol[unteer] opportunities were designed,” she said. “Originally they were allowed to serve in hospitals and museums and disciplines of that nature but they wanted more peer-to-peer volunteer type ini-

tiative, and now we’re providing volunteers to family members who take care of dementia and Alzheimer’s so they can have some time to regroup.”

According to the Elderly Commission, this program has allowed thousands of Boston residents the ability to age-in-place in their homes, one of the stated goals of Boston Mayor Marty Walsh’s administration. 
